A "SALAD" PARTY
 Sounds harmless enough, doesn't it, with visions of physical-fitness followers munching on lettuce and carrots, sipping tomato juice. A salad party is neither harmless nor healthy, but is another of the current drug fads making the rounds with youngsters. A group gets together after raiding their family's medicine cabinet at home and throw all of the accumulated pills into a bowl. Sitting in a circle around the bowl, they take a capsule or pill, swallow it, until all of the pills are gone. Then they wait to see what kind of reaction they have. They have no idea what they are taking and the family medicine cabinet can offer them a whole range of potent drugs which are to be taken only under a physician's supervision as directed for a specific condition. When taken randomly, they can cause any number of side effects ranging from the relatively minor to the very severe. Hypersensitivity or drug inter-action further increases the danger.
 Check your medicine cabinet. Throw out any old unused medications. Make sure that your children understand that no medications are to be removed by them because of the potential hazard to their health.
 A "salad" party is a new form of "Russian Roulette". It could be fatal.

Lost College Girl Sets Forest Fire To Bring in Assistance

When a lost University of Oregon coed was unable to alert searchers with signal devices in the Mt. Washington Wilderness area, she started a forest fire.

A U.S. Forest Service fire surveillance airplane spotted the smoke Sunday and dispatched a fire-suppression crew by helicopter. They found a city block fire and Cherie Lynne Becker, 21, missing since Monday, July 17.

She said she tried signal fires but only small fires are permitted in a Wilderness Area so they did not attract attention...so I started a block area of forest on fire."

After helping to extinguish the fire, Miss Becker was flown by helicopter to the Santiam Highway Junction. A Linn County sheriff's car transported her to Sweet Home where her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Richard Lofton of McMinnville were waiting. Lofton is a Yamhill County sheriff's deputy.

Miss Becker was found in lava flows about four miles southwest of Belknap Crater and several miles from Skyline Trail. She was in good physical condition. She had planned a two-day outing.

The search did not get started until Thursday when her parents in McMinnville began checking when she did not show up for a birthday party that day. The search was called off Saturday.

Miss Becker, when asked if she would go hiking alone again, said she doesn't plan to make a practice of it.
