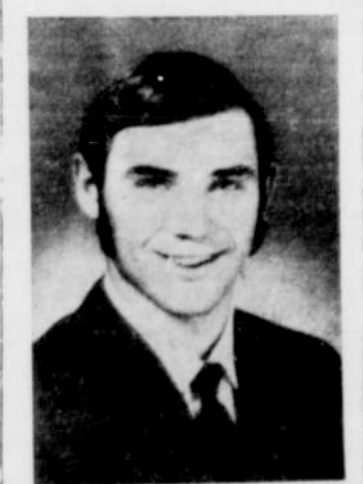

July Cooler Than 1971 In Detroit Area

DETROIT—The following is the monthly weather reading for July 1972, with comparative readings for the same period a year ago.

The high temperature of the month was 95 degrees on the 4th, with the lowest being 40 degrees on the 9th. The average mean was 66 degrees. There were 23 sunny days and five partly sunny. The balance were cloudy, with thunder and lightning on the 21st and in the early morning hours of the 30th. Total precipitation was .05 inches, with two days of gusty winds.

In July 1971, high temperature was 97 degrees on the 26th, the low 38 on the 2nd, with an average mean of 71 degrees. Total precipitation was 40 inches, with thunder and lightning on the 30th and 31st. Total precipitation for the year to date is 62.97 inches.

The accident happened so quickly it is not known if she pulled on the cord or the iron tipped and fell.

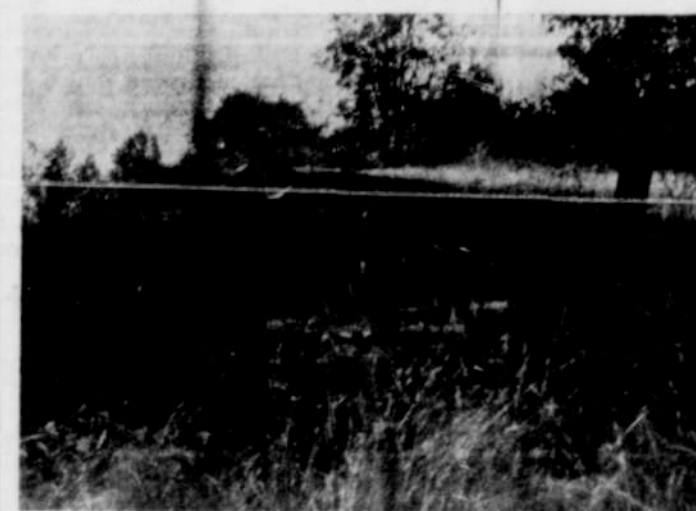

Forest Service Sales Total \$9,661,122.00

DETROIT — An estimated 150,650,000 board feet of timber was sold for \$9,661,122 in 26 public auctions conducted by the Willamette National Forest Service during May and June.

In the mid-Willamette Valley, Detroit Ranger District held two sales with an estimated 8,770,000 board feet which brought bids totaling \$457,683.

Residents Attend Hearing On New Sewer System

Approximately 25 residents attended the public hearing Monday evening, July 31, at the City Hall in Mill City. The hearing was on the "Lark Addition", Circle Drive, sewer system drainage plans.

Most of the homeowners were present to ask questions in reference to the expense of the new system. They also asked how long the proposed system would last or if it were only a temporary repair.

The Council was also questioned as to how long it would be before a city-wide sewer

system would be installed as the State is requesting.

Mayor Herb Peck stated this could take three to five years and possibly longer as there is lots to be done before it can even be presented to the voters.

The majority of the residents involved in the new sewer system were agreeable for the City to go ahead with installing the additional three 1500 gallon tanks and drainfield as there is now an open drainage ditch with raw sewage running which is causing concern among residents in the area.

Wesley Jahn, Supt. of Schools, asked the Council for a two weeks delay to enable him to report to the School Board for their decision. This was granted.

The Council hopes to be able to let the Bid at a special meeting on Wednesday, August 16, with installation to begin as soon as possible.

Much Vandalism Being Reported In The Detroit Area

DETROIT—It has been noted in recent weeks that both vandalism and rowdiness is on the increase in the Detroit area.

In recent weeks Detroit school buses have been the target, apparently by youngsters, who have broken windows, side mirrors, headlights, and sprayed the inside of the buses with the bus fire extinguishers. Gas has also been stolen from the buses. The breakage is being done by rock throwing and air-rifles. Hippie type people have also been caught sleeping in the buses.

Another disgusting development on recent weekends is the throwing of beer bottles on city streets and in peoples yards. This is usually done by car loads of young people. The breaking of the bottles on city streets is dangerous, inasmuch as many vacationers, including many children, walk the streets barefooted. The splinters of glass can also puncture car tires. In some instances, residents residing here attempt to clean up the mess on the streets when they know it is there but, trying to clean up fine splintered glass from rough paved streets is no easy job. Anyone seeing these characters committing an act like this should attempt to get their license number and report it, either to the city council or to the state police.

I once heard it said, that the only nut in a car was the one behind the wheel. Detroit has a noise ordinance prohibiting any unnecessary noise.
