**Dog Control Law
To Be Enforced**

DETROIT—Dog owners are being reminded that the new Dog Control measure, prohibiting dogs to run at large in Marion County, will go into effect August 14. Voters approved enactment of the law by a 344,320 to 11,927 margin in the May primary election.

State law defines a dog as running at large "when it is off or outside of the premises belonging to the owner or keeper of such dog, or not in company of and under the control of its owner or keeper."

Hunting dogs and animals used for protection or herding of livestock are exempt.

Marion County Animal Control Officer Marvin Melrose, says: "A dog owner who allows his animal to run at large will be cited into court. Maximum penalty for the violation is \$50." He suggests to owners who have let their dogs run free, to practice a "humane preparation", by confining or tying up their dog for gradually longer periods of time each day. "The animals will become more accustomed to confinement," he said.

The measure was placed on the ballot through the efforts of the Committee for Dog Control in Marion County.

**Deadline Near For
Deer, Elk Permits**

Big game hunters are reminded that time is running out if they intend to file applications for antlerless deer and elk permits if they wish to be included in the drawings. Nimrods interested in hunting cougar also have only a limited time in which to file.

According to rules adopted by the Game Commission, nimrods have until August 8 to submit applications for antlerless deer and until August 22 to file for elk and cougar permits. Applications received after the filing deadlines will not be included in the drawings.

Drawing for antlerless deer permits is scheduled August 16; the drawing for elk permits and cougar tags will be held September 1.

**Custom License
Available For
Vacation Vehicles**

Oregon's custom license plate program has been extended to permit owners of motor homes and travel trailers to apply for the special plates.

Chester W. Ott, administrator of the Motor Vehicles Division, says the agency has now reached the point where these two new classes can be included in the program without interfering with the records keeping requirements.

Additional fee for a custom plate on these classes will also be \$25 each year, with that amount ear-marked for the litter clean-up program. The regular fee for a motor home is \$20 plus \$1.50 per foot for each foot over the first 10 feet. For a travel trailer, the regular fee is \$10, plus \$1.50 a foot for each foot over the first 10 feet.

Custom plate applications for motor homes and travel trailers will be subject to the same guidelines as for passenger cars. Owners will be restricted to six letters or six numbers, or a combination of the two, Ott said. Applications are accepted at all Motor Vehicle Division field offices.

A travel trailer owner who already has a customized license plate on his car or pick-up cannot use the same combination of letters or numbers on the travel trailer plate, but he can have a different combination if he wants a custom plate on both units.

Oregon began issuing customized license plates for passenger vehicles in March, 1970. Nearly 6,700 custom plates have been issued with total revenue amounting to \$167,000.
