## Forest Service To Spend \$100,000 For Trails

The Willamette National Forest will spend more than \$100,000 during Fiscal Year 1973 to construct approximately 6.3 miles of trail, it was announced by Forest Supervisor Zane G. Smith, Jr.

Trail budgets planned for the next 12 months are an additional 3.3 miles to the existing McKenzie River Trail, 5.5 miles to the Fall Creek Trail, 3.5 miles to the existing Waldo Lake Trail, a 2.5 mile trail to Corrigan Lake, a 1/2 mile trail at Salt Creek Falls, and a one-mile trail on Johnny Creek, near Fall Creek, for the blind and physically handicapped.

"This trail program reflects the changing objectives for recreational trail development in the Willamette," Smith said. "In the past, trails were primarily designed and built for administrative access and as a transportation facility. The current program, however, reflects more concern for recreational needs of people in elevation areas of the Forest."

The Supervisor said that except for the Pacific Crest National Scenic Trail, the Forest is placing emphasis on trails outside of wilderness, pending completion of detailed wilderness management plans.

He also said the Forest wants to catch up on needed trail recreational opportunities in lower elevation areas. "All of this," Smith said, "reflects the emphasis placed on recreational trails that came from the 'Sales and Trails Breakfast' the Forest Service held last year, plus advice from a citizens' ad hoc committee on trails, which met during 1971, as well as the coordinated land use planning by Forest Service planning teams."

In Fiscal Year 1972, which ended on June 30, Smith said \$110,000 had been spent constructing a total of 20 miles of

trails. This included 6 miles of the Pacific Crest Trail within the Mt. Jefferson Wilderness, 6 miles of the McKenzie River Trail, 6 miles of the Fall Creek Trail, and 3 miles of the North-South Peak Trail which is still under construction. "We are making a real attempt in designing these new trails to give the hiker a first-class recreation opportunity. We want to aid him in relating to the environment," Smith said.

"One of the unique trail projects in the Forest," Smith added, "involves construction of the Johnny Creek Trail which is being done under a cooperative agreement with the Eugene Lions' Club and the Forest Service." This trail construction will be completed this summer and will result in a nature trail for blind and physically handicapped persons. "I am particularly excited about this trail project," the Supervisor said. "This represents another concern of ours: providing recreational opportunities for the physically handicapped."

### Pigeon And Dove Seasons Set

The Oregon Game Commission has adopted regulations for the taking of band-tailed pigeons and mourning doves for 1972 with the season on both birds scheduled from September 1 through September 30.

These regulations were discussed previously at the big game regulations hearing in June but final adoption was delayed until the federal regulatory framework on these migratory birds was received.

Bag limit for pigeons is 8 per day, 8 in possession. Bag limit on mourning doves is 10 per day, 20 in possession.

Regulations for the taking of other upland gamebirds, waterfowl, and furbearing animals will be set by the Commission following a public hearing scheduled August 12. At that time full information will be available to the Commission on the status of the bird populations. Recommendations from the public will also be heard and given consideration in the deliberations.

The public meeting will be held at the Commission's Portland headquarters, 1634 SW Alder, and will convene at 10:00 a.m. All interested persons are invited to attend and express their views.
