Small Forest Blaze Is Extinguished

DETROIT — A forest fire that burned some two acres of timber, in the Bruno Meadows area of the Willamette National Forest last week, was brought under control the next day (Thursday) U. S. Forest Service, Fire Control Officer, Val Andermatt said. The fire of undetermined origin was first sighted Wednesday about 7:45 p. m., burning in an area of "decayed timber" two and a half air miles Northwest of Marion Forks in the Bruno Meadows area.

The 39 men on the fireline were aided by two helicopters and a bulldozer.

The site of the fire was next to a clear-cut area and firemen were having difficulty in extinguishing fires in burning snags. Forest Service officials said the helicopters were used to dump water on the blaze Thursday morning.

Andermatt said cause of the fire is still under investigation.

At the General Election this November, Mill City will elect a Mayor and two Councilmen, said City Recorder Judith Bogle this week.

The terms of Mayor Herb Peck and Councilmen Dale Howell and Larry Plotts will expire. The councilmen positions are four year terms and the Mayor, two years. Councilman Howell is Building Commissioner and Plotts is Safety Commissioner.

Anyone wishing to run for any of the offices is required to file a petition with the City Recorder at least 30 days prior to the November election, and must be a resident 12 months prior to the election. The nomination petitions may be obtained at the City Recorder's office at the City Hall any weekday between the hours of 10:00 a. m. to 12 noon and 1:00 p. m. to 3:00 p. m.

Water Service Here Back to Normal

Mill City's Water Reservoirs are back at full level, according to John Kohls, Manager for Pacific Power & Light Company, who said the Company greatly appreciated the prompt response and co-operation of residents who curtailed water usage last week when an emergency developed at the raw water pump station.

Kohls said the assistance of the city officials in permitting the city patrol officer to tour the residential area alerting householders to the need to curtail water was extremely helpful.

"Our inspectors at the reservoirs could see the water levels beginning to rise in the two tanks almost simultaneously with the patrolman's announcement from the patrol car's loud speaker," Kohls explained.

He said the installation of a portable pump permitted resumption of normal water usage last Thursday evening. The company's engineers are now making a study of what needs to be done to assure ample pumping capacity.

Keep Out of Pump House; It's Dangerous

Someone evidently got through the fence at the Mill City pumping station, owned by Pacific Power & Light Company sometime between Sunday p. m. and Monday a. m. John Kohls, PP&L manager from Stayton said Tuesday afternoon that whoever it was shut off a 480 volt automatic switch, causing one of the pumps to shut off. Another pump cut in and the water level at the reservoir did not drop.

However, all people are warned that these 480 volt switches are not to be fooled with. They are dangerous and could cause sudden death to whoever monkeys around with them.

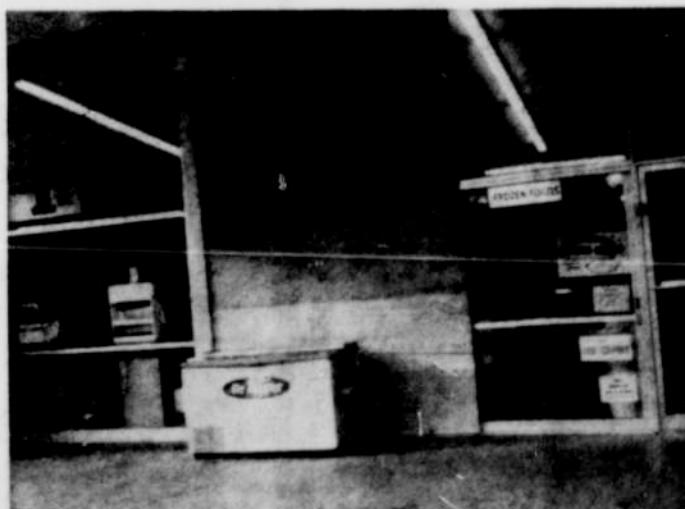
Two From Area

Santiam Memorial Now Has Weekend Emergency Service

Gale Christensen today told The Enterprise that Santiam Memorial hospital at Stayton now has at least emergency room coverage for the weekends. As there are now only two practicing doctors in Stayton, it has been impossible for them to take care of emergencies on a 24-hour daily basis. The board of directors has been working for some time to alleviate this situation.

As the situation now stands, according to Christensen, there will be a doctor in the emergency room at Santiam Memorial from 6 p. m. on Friday nights until midnight on Sunday nights. This facet of the program is expected to be on a permanent basis. This does not mean that the two local doctors will not handle any emergencies. This is to give them some weekend relief.

Christensen said that over the Labor Day weekend, there will be a doctor at the hospital from 6 p. m. Friday until 6 a. m. Tuesday. The hospital is doing its best to give the area the best service possible during the time there is a doctor shortage. Many doctors have been contacted but nothing definite for the immediate future is in sight.

Escaped Con Found Near Breitenbush

DETROIT—The peace of this little community was disturbed Thursday when it was learned that escaped convict Calvin Wayne Dow Jr. was in the Breitenbush area. He had escaped from the Oregon State Hospital, Salem, on Tuesday morning of last week.

He was captured early Friday morning while asleep in a vacationing couple's trailer near Breitenbush Resort.

While a flock of law enforcement officers trained rifles, pistols and shot guns through the trailer window, two state policemen rushed inside and grabbed Dow, who was sleeping soundly with a 22 caliber magnum pistol beside him.

The capture ended one of the area's biggest manhunt for an escaped felon in many years. The search began about 6:15 A. M. Tuesday after Dow sawed through a bar in the Maximum Security Unit at the Hospital and jumped some 25 feet to temporary freedom.

The capture came about 6:50 A. M. after Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Range, Portland, returned to their trailer after being cautioned the night before by police to leave the area when Dow eluded pursuing officers in the area Thursday. The Ranges noticed a plastic rock guard on the front of the trailer was in a closed position after they had left it open. A curtain had also been closed. A window had been closed and glass in the door broken.

Ranges peered through a window and saw a man sleeping on a bunk in the trailer. The Ranges notified the law enforcement command post 12 miles from the trailer and many of the police, sheriff's deputies and FBI agents from Salem and Portland converged on the trailer. State Police Lt. Mark Kezar and Trooper Barry Drake, using a key furnished by the Ranges, entered the trailer and took Dow in custody. Obviously tired and in some minor pain from injuries received when he leaped from the third floor window at the State Hospital, Dow was searched and taken to the State Penitentiary about 8:20 A. M. He was later transferred to the Marion County jail where he awaits trial on a charge of first degree murder in the death of Lt. Robert Greer, an officer at the State Penitentiary who was knifed in the prison yard last April.

Quiet Session For Council This Month

The Mill City City Council met in regular session last Wednesday evening, August 9.

The Council authorized payment of \$1,703.85 in bills. The police reported 60 traffic citations and 27 warnings issued and two prisoners lodged. There were 14 complaints reported, 84 incidents and three accidents reported. Court cases processed were 62.

In other business, the City granted a permit for a mobile home on Fairview Street.

Everett Hamilton of Mill City Hardware asked why his display items had to be taken off the sidewalk when other stores did not comply with this rule.

A proposed franchise with Pacific Power and Light was read.

The Council will meet again Wednesday, August 16, at 8:00 p. m. at a special meeting to accept bids on the sewer and drainfield installation on Circle Drive and read new resolutions proposed for the city.

Marion Forks Lodge May Be Rebuilt

MARION FORKS—Canyonites of the North Santiam Canyon were saddened by the destructive fire that destroyed Marion Forks Lodge 16 miles East of Detroit early Wednesday morning of last week. The popular landmark with its hospitable staff was widely known to many a traveler as well as to many vacationers who annually visited the area.

The blaze was reported about 12:30 A. M. Wednesday by a passing motorist. When volunteer firemen from the Idanha Rural Fire Protection District arrived, the roof of the two story wooden structure had collapsed.

Cause of the fire which started in the south end of the structure, was undetermined but it was thought possibly due to faulty wiring.

The lodge was constructed in 1946 and opened in November of that year. It was owned by Mr. and Mrs. Scott Young and in recent years operated by their daughter Mrs. Dorothy Johnson.

Mrs. Johnson said she had checked the building about mid-night after closing for the night.

U. S. Forest Service men assisted in preventing spread of the flames to surrounding forests. Highway 22 was closed for about three hours, state police said.

Last weeks fire marked the second destruction by fire at the site. In February, 1946, flames wiped out the Scott Youngs first lodge on Highway 22. The couple rebuilt near the site and it has stood for a little more than a quarter of a century as a popular place for travelers crossing the Cascade mountains and as a base point for fishermen visiting the many lakes and streams in the area.

The Scott Youngs came to Marion Forks in 1932, to a 40 acre tract where they lived in a pole house in spring, summer and fall. Winters were spent in Detroit.

The lodge and restaurant business at Marion Forks developed over the years as travelers and fishermen stopped on their travels.

The Youngs retired several years ago leaving management to their daughter Dorothy. Their son Robert Young and family also reside at Marion Forks. Members of the family said they believed the lodge would be rebuilt a second time.

Mrs. Johnson estimated insurance on the building and contents will cover about one-third of the loss. Antique furniture, dishes, cut-glass mementos and Keepsakes were lost in the flames.

Limited on Sprinkling

DETROIT—Due to the recent hot weather and heavy use of water, the Detroit City Council ordered restrictions on sprinkling and other unnecessary use of water in the Detroit area.

Beginning Saturday morning, August 12, all residents on the West side of the North Santiam Highway can water on odd days, and all those residing on the East side of the highway can water on even days.

There will be no watering or unnecessary use of water after 12:00 noon on any day until further notice.
