Cat work seems to be going ahead full blast on the Re-Mine project on the west side of town. Beginning to look better already.

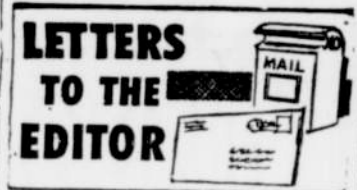

**People's Telephone Co. To Serve More Private Lines**

LYONS—People's Telephone Company, of the Lyons-Mehama area are installing larger outside telephone cables. Underground conduit was installed from the central office to 6th and Main Street and at the new Santiam River Bridge. In the conduits will be placed 300 and 600 pair cables to make available more private lines.

In the early part of 1972, \$12,000.00 in the new central office was invested making available 550 lines and 900 numbers. The company is now serving 800 telephones. This fall, the company plans to blacktop the parking area.

George Neal was re-elected on the board of directors at the annual meeting. E. W. Rector presented the annual report and the Telephone Company board declared a dividend to the stockholders.

**QUESTION:**  
Is the Job Corps still recruiting in Oregon?

**ANSWER:**  
Yes. In fact, an intensive effort is being made to enroll a minimum of 700 young men during the current year.

Unemployed or unskilled young men and women can earn while they learn a trade.

Most Oregon recruits are now assigned to Angell Job Corps Center near Yachats on the Oregon coast, while female enrollees will be assigned to Tongue Point Job Corps Center near Astoria.

Those young men who qualify will be paid a minimum of \$50 per month while preparing for such fields as auto mechanics, building maintenance, carpentry, painting, food service, welding, and heavy equipment operation.

Opportunities in business clerical, electronics assembly, health occupations, drafting and food/housekeeping service will be available to the young women who qualify for Tongue Point.

Those individuals from the Portland Metropolitan Tri-County area will be assigned to the Portland Residential Manpower Center.
