Three Local Women Honored by Mill City Garden Club

Patricia Whitmore, Marilyn (Molly) Larson and Nancy Girard have been selected Outstanding Young Women of America for 1972, according to an announcement today by the Mill City Garden Club.

They were nominated by the organization earlier this year on the basis of their achievements. Now in its eighth year, the Outstanding Young Women of America program recognizes young women between the ages of 21 and 35 for their contributions to the betterment of their communities, professions and country.

More than 6,000 young women are nominated annually as Outstanding Young Women of America by civic organizations, churches and college alumni associations throughout the country. Complete biographical sketches of all nominees are featured in the annual awards publication, OUTSTANDING YOUNG WOMEN OF AMERICA.

The women included in the 1972 edition are now in competition for further state and national awards. This fall, fifty of them—one from each state—will be named as their state's Outstanding Young Woman of the Year. From the fifty state winners, the national Ten Outstanding Young Women of America for 1972 will be selected.

The Outstanding Young Women of America Program was conceived—and is today guided—by leaders of the nation's major women's organizations. Serving on the program's Board of Advisors are the national presidents of women's clubs, headed by Mrs. Dexter Otis Arnold, honorary president of the General Federation of Women's Clubs.

In November, the 1972 edition of OUTSTANDING YOUNG WOMEN OF AMERICA will be published. The volume, to be distributed nationally as a reference publication, will include special introductory messages by U.S. Rep. Martha Griffiths (D-MI.) and Amy Vanderbilt, the nation's leading etiquette authority.
