HAROLD H. JENKINS

EARL R. HITCHMAN

Funeral services were held Monday at 10:30 a. m. at Barkley's Chapel in Salem for Earl R. Hitchman, 76, who passed away last Wednesday in a Salem Nursing Home following a long illness.

He was well known in the Mill City area as he was a logger and sawmill man. He logged on the North Fork with Converse under the name of C & H Logging Co. in the late 40s and then was in the sawmill business. His mill was located where Cedar Lumber Co. now is located and it burned in the early 50s.

In 1945 Hitchman started the Salem Equipment, Inc. in Salem where he manufactured small sawmill equipment. The firm started as a four-man shop for manufacturing and repairing small sawmill equipment. It has grown until it is now one of the top sawmill machinery manufacturing businesses in the world. It now employs 115 people and has annual sales of over \$3 million.

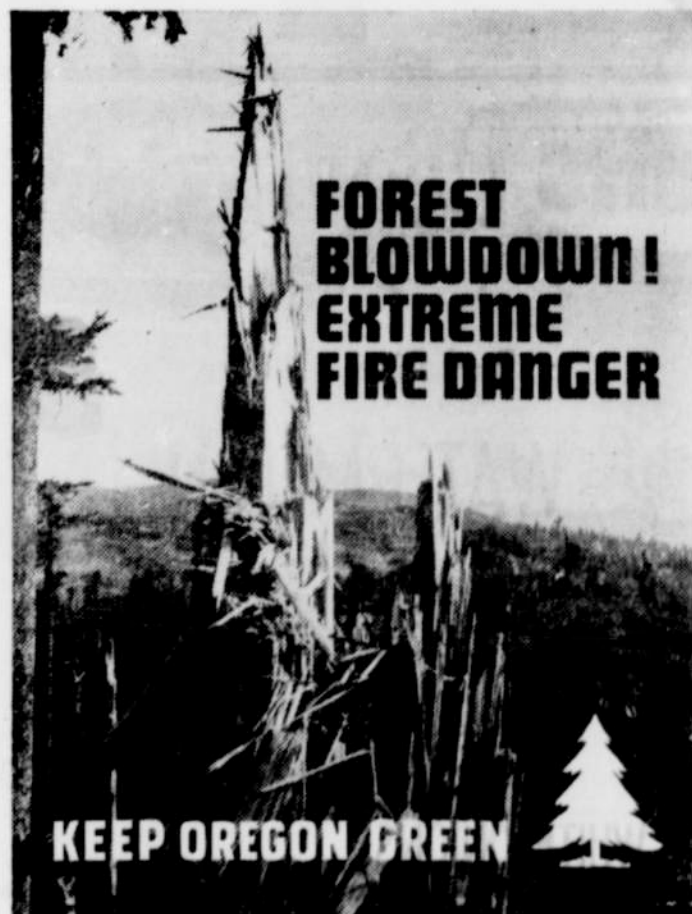
