## Governor Asks Motorists to Drive With Lights On

Governor Tom McCall this week appealed to Oregon motorists to join state government and four major utilities in a program to reduce traffic accidents.

McCall said, "I am appalled by the rising tragic toll of accidents, injuries and deaths on our highways. We must do everything we possibly can to prevent this lamentable loss of property and lives."

Through July, 422 persons have died in Oregon traffic accidents, an increase of 60 over the first seven months of 1971.

McCall said state employees and the employees of Pacific Northwest Bell, Pacific Power and Light, Portland General Electric and Northwest Natural Gas will drive with "Lights on for Safety" during the entire month of September. Auto headlights will be on during both daylight and evening hours in state and company cars.

McCall said, "It also will be strongly urged that the employees and members of their families operate their own private vehicles with lights on at all times in September."

Impetus for the "Lights on for Safety" program came from the utilities, the governor said.

Similar programs have been conducted by other private companies, the governor said. The Greyhound Company, for instance, reported an 11 percent reduction in accidents through a lights-on campaign over a period of five years, he said.

Vehicles are more visible in daylight hours when driven with the lights on, McCall said. In addition, he said, the program should create a greater statewide awareness of the need to drive carefully.

**VERNON D. GOODELL**  
LYONS — Funeral services were held Wednesday, September 13, at 1:30 p. m. at Weddle Funeral Home in Stayton for Vernon D. Goodell, 82, who died Sunday in the Marian Home, Sublimity. He was born in Tacoma, and came to the Lyons-Mehama area in 1918 and worked in sawmills until his retirement in 1957.

He is survived by his widow, Sylvia, of Lyons, one daughter, Mrs. Inez Schneider of Mehama, two sons, Jack and Clarence, both of Lyons, sister, Mrs. Ruth Barr of Tacoma, seven grandchildren and 13 great-grandchildren. Interment was in Lone Oak Cemetery, Stayton.

## State Forestry Department Gets Road Repair Funds

Governor Tom McCall has been advised that another \$1,750,000 has been advanced to the State Forestry Department for repair of roads damaged in the late January flood in Western Oregon.

William Mayer, Seattle, regional director of the Federal Office of Emergency Preparedness, said the advance brings to \$2,397,000 the funds granted so far to the Forestry Department. The department and federal inspectors estimated total damage to forest roads in nine counties at \$3,618,254, and additional payments are expected.

At McCall's request, President Nixon declared all of Western Oregon a disaster area following the severe rainstorms in January. That made the Forestry Department, and other state and local agencies eligible to apply for financial assistance from the Office of Emergency Preparedness.

State Forester Ed Schroeder said the money provides for repair of state-owned timber access roads and the network of fire protection roads damaged by flooding.

The counties where road damage occurred are: Clatsop, Tillamook, Lincoln, Lane, Coos, Douglas, Linn, Clackamas, and Washington.

## Deer Permits Available in Three Special Hunts

The Oregon Game Commission today advised big game hunters that permit quotas in three special deer hunting areas are undersubscribed. Surplus permits will be issued on a first-come, first-served basis until quotas are met.

As of August 24, permits are available for the Adair Tract located in Benton County, Calapooya Creek located in Douglas County, and Randall Saddle located in Lincoln County. Permits for all other special seasons and game management units were oversubscribed and a drawing held August 18. Hunters unsuccessful in the drawings may refile for one of the above seasons if they so desire or keep the notice for future preference. Surplus permits are expected to be snapped up quickly. The Adair Tract season is scheduled November 18 and 19.

## Bowl Down Cancer Tourney Slated

The 12th annual Bowl Down Cancer tournament will be held in all bowling centers in Oregon, October 1 to 15. This is sponsored by the Oregon State Bowling Proprietors Association as a benefit for the American Cancer Society. Last year, over \$27,000 was raised for this event and over \$250,000 has been raised during the past eleven years.

Once again, the top prizes are two new Volkswagen sedans, one donated by the Oregon State Bowling Association and one by the Volkswagen dealers of Oregon. There are 40 donated prizes valued at \$7,000, 20 for men and 20 for women.

The tournament is open to all league bowlers who donate fifty cents in the Qualifying Round to try to beat their average in their third game. They can enter as often as they wish. They enter the House Eliminations by October 29. One third then advances to the House Finals by November 12. In many centers, local prizes are donated for this round of the tournament.

One Third finally advance to the State Finals which will be held December 2, 3, and 10 if necessary. Newberg Bowl will host the men bowlers and Rainbow Lanes in Forest Grove will host the women.

About 30,000 bowlers qualify and about 1,000 reach the finals. Prizes will be awarded in January soon after the winning list is published. Other major prizes are a color TV, milk stole, cottage tent and a movie camera. Local bowlers are urged to watch for the tournament and enter the fight against cancer.
