## Pharmacy Topics

In a recent study by the New England Journal of medicine, 70% of the health information on television is inaccurate or misleading. The study included both actual programs and commercials.

The Senate Finance Committee approved a plan to cover under Medicare most of the cost of certain prescription drugs for chronically ill older persons. The inclusion of drugs will represent the most far-reaching expansion of Medicare benefits since the program first became law 7 years ago. It is most certain that it will be at least 1973 before the program will become operational.

A vaccine that protects against infectious mononucleosis may be on the way, according to early findings at Northwestern and Evanston Hospitals. More elaborate trials must be conducted before the vaccine can be made commercially available however.
