Kellys Spend Week At Salt Lake City

Postmaster and Mrs. Charles Kelly recently returned from spending approximately a week in Salt Lake City, Utah, attending the 68th Annual Convention of the National Association of Postmasters of the United States which convened at the spectacular Salt Palace from September 17 through September 21.

Kelly, who is the new president of the Oregon Chapter, was a voting delegate at the sessions which were attended by about 2500 Postmasters from the 50 states, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands.

The annual convention, held in a different location each year, affords Postmasters an opportunity to hold business and educational meetings, seminars, panel discussions, and consultation sessions with top officials of the United States Postal Service.

Postmaster General E. T. Klassen, the featured speaker at the Salt Lake City gathering, was joined by several of his top aides to discuss policy and operational matters.

Often termed the nation's largest business, the Postal Service employs nearly 750,000 persons, with a Postmaster in charge at each of the nation's post offices. The offices vary in size from the largest in New York City with more than 42,000 employees, to the small rural offices where the Postmaster often handles the entire business alone.

The Association of 30,000 members, headed by Postmaster Frank Miklozek of Terre Haute, Ind., has a Chapter in each state and maintains a national office at Washington, D. C. Postmaster Emmett Sutherland of Galena, Kan., is national secretary-treasurer.

Headquarters for this year's convention was the Hotel Utah with delegates also staying in 23 other hotels and motels throughout the city for the festivities.

Special activities for the guests on Sunday morning, included the famous television broadcast by the Mormon Tabernacle Choir which was followed by a special concert for the postmasters, followed by a tour of Temple Square for any interested. A short time later, the Salt Lake City Post Office Band performed at the Salt Palace Plaza. On Sunday evening, a reception was held for National President, Frank and Mrs. Miklozek in the huge auditorium of the Salt Palace, followed by dancing.

The general business session opened Monday morning with most of the over 30 Oregon delegates and guests attending. The visitors were welcomed by the Governor of Utah, the Mayor of Salt Lake City, the Host Postmaster from Salt Lake, the president of the Utah chapter and Regional Postmaster General Fred Huleen of the San Francisco Regional Center. Presentation of the Colors and a Memorial Service were highlights of the opening ceremonies.

Following the business meeting, and during the morning hours for guests, tours of the historic city of Salt Lake and the Mormon Trail were offered.

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Monday evening, a presentation of "Holiday on Ice" was enjoyed at the Arena of the Salt Palace. Another tour on Monday afternoon was to Park City and a golf tournament was also held for anyone wishing to take part.

On Tuesday afternoon, a Ladies' Style Show and Concert by Robert Peterson was held at the Promised Valley Playhouse after which the ladies came out to a sudden downpour of rain, but rides were soon provided. Mrs. Frank Miklozek was chairman of the event. Tours were also offered to Snowbird, a ski resort and to the Wasatch Canyons.

States' night was Tuesday evening with receptions, dinners and hospitality activities sponsored by the chapters at the various hotels and motels. Oregon delegates were proud of their hospitality room stocked by many attractive Oregon products hauled to the site by the Kellys with a U-haul trailer. Many postmasters throughout the state donated products from their locality including bushels of apples, sugar-pine cones, canned foods, smoked meats, prunes, bottled cherries, and colorful pamphlets, as well as samples of seeds, and agates from the coast. Drawings were held for prizes also.

Besides business sessions Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday there were tours to the Kennecott Copper Mine, the largest open-pit mine in the world, and to the Great Salt Lake in which a person cannot sink due to the density of the salt. Tuesday night was the reception and dinner honoring chapter officers at the Hotel Utah with Jim Landers of Beaverton as Master of Ceremonies. A Variety Show was put on by Brigham Young University students in the Auditorium later. Sessions concluded about Thursday noon.

The Grand Banquet and Ball were held Thursday night with a dance exhibition by the B.Y.U. Ballroom Dancers during intermission. Postmaster Bill Fair of Stayton served on the Daily Bulletin committee. The convention will be in the Concord Resort, New York, next year.
