

Shelters Destroyed In Wilderness Area

DETROIT—The U. S. Forest Service has destroyed four shelters in the Three Sisters Wilderness area in an attempt to remove evidence of "permanent improvements of humane habitation" from the country's wilderness areas.

Ed Graham, ranger in the McKenzie River District, said foresters razed and burned Sunshine Shelter, the Horse Lake Trail Shelter, the Horse Lake Guard Station and an old barn. He said the shelters were in need of repair.

Removal of shelters is also expected to discourage concentration of hikers in any one part of the wilderness, Graham said.

He said shelters at Mink Lake, Cliff Lake, James Creek and Buck Mountain will be phased out as they fall into disrepair.

Forest Service To Burn 2,300 Acres Of Slash This Fall

DETROIT — An estimated 2,300 acres of slash from logging operations will be burned this fall in the Detroit District of the Willamette National Forest, if weather conditions permit, U. S. Forest Service officials announced.

Val Andermatt, fire control officer for the Forest Service, said burning will be done as weather conditions permit and some burning has already been completed.

Sixteen acres of slash on Timber Butte was burned recently, 166 acres in the Park Santiam area and 16 acres in the Parkett Seaburn area was touched off Wednesday of last week. Twenty-nine acres at Straight Creek and 40 acres at Law Creek were slated to be burned last Friday.

Marion Co. Health Clinic at Detroit

DETROIT—At a recent Marion County Health Clinic immunization conference held at Detroit school 58* students, grades one through 12, received 68 immunizations. Twelve pre-schoolers received 20 immunizations and two adults a shot each. Twenty-one physicals were given.

In comparison, last years record shows 149 immunizations for school students one through 12, 22 immunizations for pre-schoolers and 12 immunizations for adults, and 20 physicals.

Immunizations were down this year due to the elimination of some immunizations from the program, according to Mrs. Barbara Whiteley, coordinator.
