Pharmacy Topics

Chalk up another blow to cigarettes. According to a Georgetown University pharmacologist, Prof. **Sorell Schwartz**, a three-year study of mouse tissue infused with nicotine gives the reason smokers have a higher incidence of bodily infections than nonsmokers do. His research shows that nicotine, after entering the bloodstream, is carried to tissue where it cuts down the macrophage cells' ability to "digest" disease-causing bacteria and viruses and to stimulate other cells' antibody production.

Chances are a fortyish woman with tennis elbow or bursitis has had a hysterectomy, says Virginia orthopedist, **Robert Nirschl**. He suspects a link between such ills and estrogen deficiency. Management personnel prefer mild tranquilizers to keep them from cracking up on the job; policemen and firemen are more apt to use barbiturates. That's the finding of Dr. **Carl D. Chambers**, who heads the division of addiction services at the University of Miami Medical School. In a study of legal and illegal drugs, consumed at work, he found that both skilled and unskilled workers tend to rely on marijuana, but that clerical and white-collar workers copy their bosses' preference for tranquilizers. The most drug-prone occupation: sales. About 36 per cent of all sales personnel, according to Chambers, use barbiturates while working.

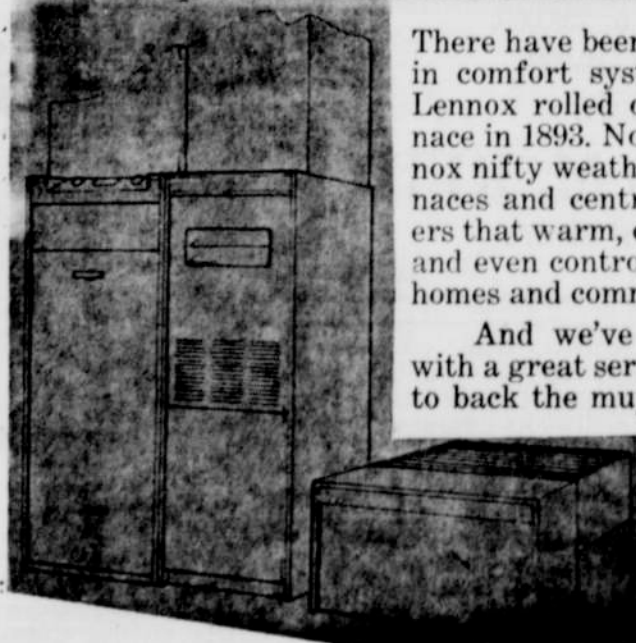
