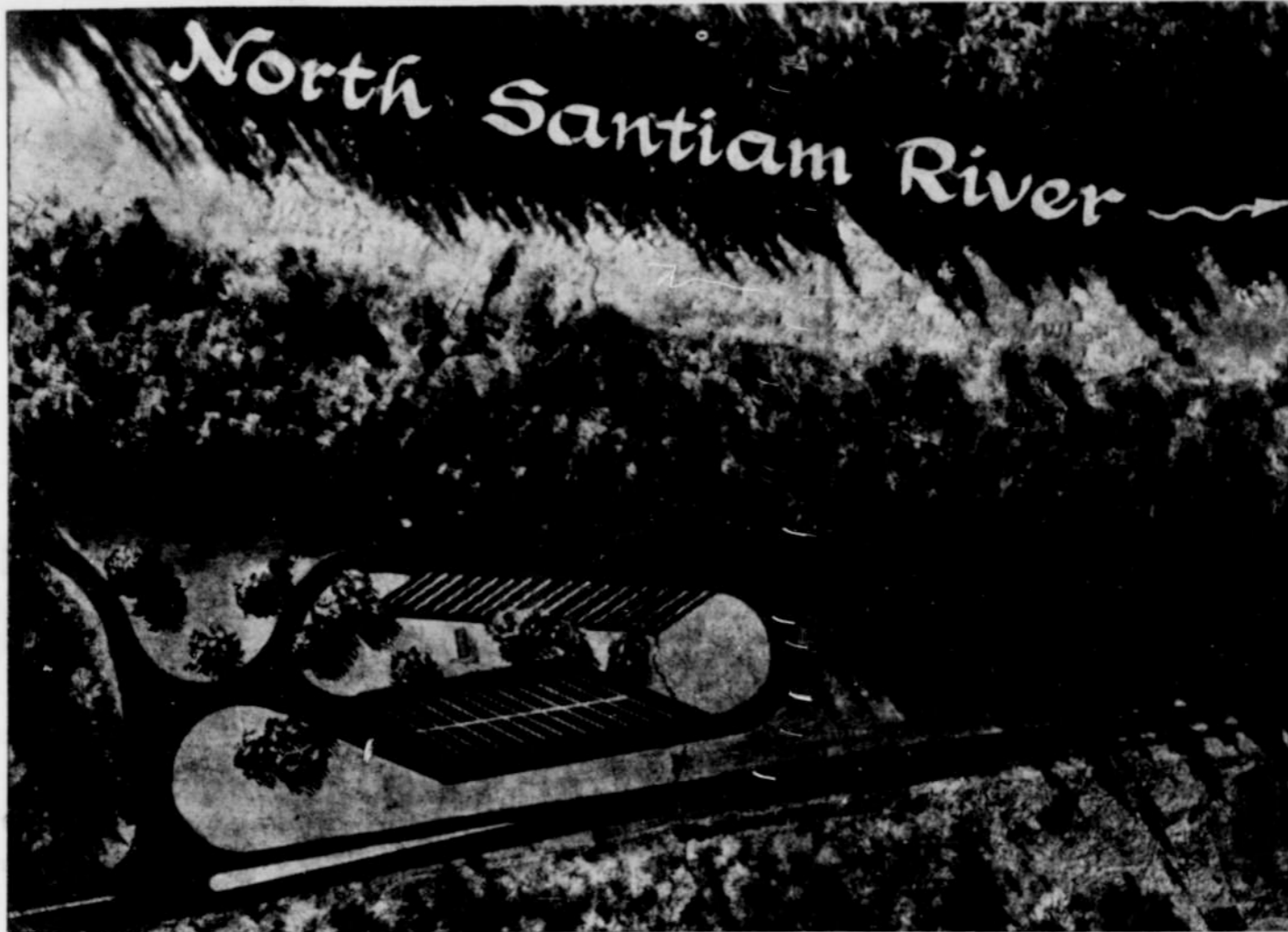

### First Aid Class To Be Offered

A Standard First Aid Class will begin on Thursday, January 11, 1973, at 7 p.m., at the Santiam High School. Persons interested in learning basic first aid training, or persons wishing to renew their skills in order to retain their Red Cross certification are encouraged to attend.

Classes will be held for two hours each (7 to 9 p.m.) on Thursday evenings for six consecutive weeks. The course consists of reading and discussing assignments and observing and applying first aid techniques. Some of the major skills that will be taught are: artificial respiration, controlling bleeding, treating fractures, transporting victims, and handling common emergencies—such as poisoning, heart attack, burn treatment, etc. Students successfully completing the course will receive a Standard American Red Cross certificate.

The course is offered free of charge, but the trainee will be required to have an American Red Cross textbook, fourth edition. The text will be available for purchase at the training session for \$1.25 (which covers only publishing costs). Anyone 14 years of age and older, or anyone who has completed the eighth grade is eligible to participate. Trainee should plan to wear clothing that permits freedom of movement when applying first aid techniques.

### Chemeketa Public Relations Specialist Speaks To Lions

Mrs. Deloris Habberstad, public relations specialist at Chemeketa Community College, was guest speaker at the December 18 Lions Club dinner meeting.

Mrs. Habberstad showed slides and spoke on the building program for new classrooms at the college. She said there are 1,500 daytime students now enrolled at Chemeketa. The college now offers 25 vocational courses and has over 4,000 adult education programs in the Marion, Polk, Yamhill and part of Linn county areas.

At the present time, there are 15 students from the Mill City, Gates and Lyons area studying at Chemeketa.
