I would again like to go on record as being unalterably opposed to pending legislation which would ban commercial fishing on the Columbia. Current statistics on winter steelhead to anyone interested, proves conclusively that sport fishermen are getting the lion's share of today's catch.

For the record in 1970, the sport fisherman on the Columbia outtaught the commercial by a ratio of 13-1 and in 1971 they upped that figure by nearly 20-1. What then do they want? I think they want to totally eliminate commercial fishing which would then mean anyone without a boat and expensive gear would be denied finding this fine food available to them at their corner grocery store or super market.

The winter runs of Salmon and Steelhead are increasing rather than decreasing and this joint partnership established in 1969 is working out quite well.

The fish in the Columbia are for all the people. Lets keep it that way.

LEGISLATIVE REPORT

The 57th Oregon Legislature "hit the ground running" as it convened in Salem last week.

Unlike the previous Oregon Legislative session, both Senate President Jason Boe, D-Reedsport, and House Speaker Richard Eymann, D-Springfield, were elected heads of their respective legislative bodies on the first ballots.

I am very pleased with my committee assignments. Once again I am on state and federal affairs and local government. My third committee is a new one called economic development which will be a continuation of the senate task force which I worked on last summer and fall.

Nearly 100 bills were sent to committees on the opening day. The senate met in the afternoon and sent about a dozen bills to committees, while the house assigned 74 bills to committees.

Among the senate bills introduced is a measure to lower the age of majority from 21 to 18. It would revise the existing state law making it legal for anyone 18 or over to consume alcoholic beverages, have access to race track betting, make blood donations, and be bound by legal contracts, and receive life insurance payments.

House bills introduced include a number of natural resource related topics. One of them being a complete re-modification of the state's fish and game laws.

The number one priority before the legislature will be to lower property taxes. Governor Tom McCall addressed the legislature presenting his tax relief program which would have the state assume most costs of running local schools.

The governor wants to eliminate the part of homeowner-property taxes used for basic school operations and have the state assume the cost by increasing income taxes by about 38%.

Another high priority subject will be legislation affecting education and school affairs. A number of groups are preparing education oriented bills including matters such as school board prerogatives, student responsibilities, teacher working conditions, and teacher training.

The legislature will be asked for a legal definition of what constitutes an adequate basic education for grade school and high school students.

The bill, proposed by the legislative interim committee on education, is designed to guarantee that a higher percentage of students leave school with functional mastery of reading, writing, math, basic science, and an understanding of how to be a good citizen in today's society.

There is a greater emphasis placed on encouraging public involvement in the legislative process. The legislature can be a real tool for bringing about social and government changes if people use it.
