*A new U. S. Public Health Service report adds another link in the growing chain of evidence showing "a strong, probably causal association between cigarette smoking and higher late fetal and infant mortality among smokers' infants." The PHS claims that about 4,600 stillbirths a year in this country can probably be blamed on smoking habits of the women involved. That figure is roughly equivalent to two-thirds of all the deaths from accidents to Americans aged 1 to 14; and accidents are the leading cause of death in this age group.

*About 3,256,000 babies were born last year, a surprising 9% decrease since 1971.

*Research is being conducted to explain why enthusiastic cereal eaters have the world's lowest stomach cancer rate. Preliminary studies show that cereals are rich in vitamin E and selenium, which appear to prevent gastric cancer in mice.

Bid Invitations Open May 1

The Portland district, Corps of Engineers, has invited bids for repair of Minto Dam, near Detroit Lake on the North Santiam River. The small dam was built by the Corps of Engineers and is operated by the Oregon Fish Commission to divert fish into a holding pond where eggs are collected for transfer to the Marion Forks Fish Hatchery.

Bids will be opened at 2:00 p.m. Tuesday, May 1 in the Portland district office for the work to repair 330 cubic yards of concrete damaged by erosion.

Repairs are to be completed by August 3 at a cost estimated to be in the \$25,000 to \$100,000 range.

Girls Track Team Loses To Colton

The Santiam girls track team dropped a 53-45 decision to the Colton team at Mill City April 12.

Santiam had six of the 12 first places, but only picked up four of the ten second places.

Lori Hildebrandt was the outstanding performer for Santiam with two individual first places and two first places on relay teams.

Lori won the 100m hurdles in 17.9 and won the long jump with a leap of 13' ½". The leap was 6¼" over her previous high for the season.

Patti Fohl won the 100 yard dash in an impressive time of 12.8; only 2 of a second behind her season's best.

Santiam placed first in both the 440 relay and the 880 medley. They won the 440 relay in 56.9, which was their best time of the season. Santiam won the 880 medley in 2:12.8.

Cheryle Lawrence, competing in her second track meet of the season, picked up a first and two second places. She collected 11 points. Lori Hildebrandt was the top point getter with 12½.
