Summer Home Owners Win Tax Suit

DETROIT — Summer home owners in the Breitenbush and Devil Creek areas of the Willamette National Forest won their case against the U. S. Forest Service, which has rejected a private appraiser's estimate of the value of the 70 summer home properties and substituted the appraisal of a staff member which was 60% higher. The county's appraisal was nearly the same as the private appraisal, but the forest service stood by its higher figure, according to the report.

The summer home owners took the case to a federal appeals board. Earlier this month they won their case. The appeals board's decision now goes to the chief of the forest service for his final action.

The summer home owners are fighting another battle against unfair taxation. According to the report, not only are they compelled to pay a federal fee for the land they occupy but they pay property taxes to local government on the land and improvements just as if they owned the property.

The federal government gives 25% of its fee back to the county as a kind of "in lieu of taxes" payment. So the county is collecting double taxes on the land from the home owners, once directly and once indirectly, through the fee the home owner pays to the federal government.

Efforts are being made at the legislature to exempt the summer home owners from this double taxation by restoring the former basis for county taxation which taxed only the improvements on the land but not the land itself.

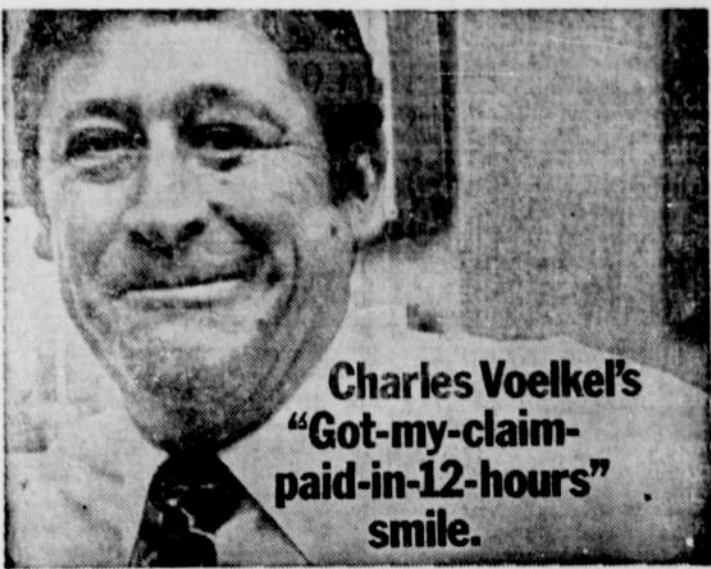
The seedlings, to be given to school teachers and youngsters, as well as individuals, are in observance of national Arbor Day on April 27.

The excessive amount of seedlings was due to an unexpected oversupply at the nursery, according to the state forestry.
