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## It Ain't All Roses

Tuesday, June 12 is the day residents will go to the poles and cast their ballot on the budget proposed by members of the budget committee and the city council.

This budget was prepared and presented to the council as a good budget for the City of Mill City and this is what you will be voting on, not the additional revenue that the council felt they should add to it at a later meeting.

It is true the budget being presented to the residents of Mill City is lower, millage-wise. It has been reduced almost a dollar per thousand true cash value on your home. But the budget is up \$61,913.50 over last year (figures taken from published budget of May 26, 1973).

With salaries up for all the city employees, what will happen next year if President Nixon cuts off the revenue sharing that the city is counting on receiving? It is a known fact that the employees are not going to work for less next year, so "bang" our taxes soar up again.

I feel that the residents of the city should have the right to discuss the budget further, prior to the election Tuesday, June 12. If enough people call Councilman John Wills, chairman of the budget committee, or the City Hall, possibly a special meeting could be called—and why not? It is much better to discuss all these proposals prior to election, rather than having residents going to the polls ill-informed on the issues. If this is your wish, make it known now, as election time is just a few days away.

In a letter to the editor, the mayor is questioning this writer for editorializing on the meeting of May 23 and stating that this paper has not covered their meetings.

This writer has covered all regular council meetings since last October, and almost all of the special council meetings that he knew of. This is a better record than most of the council members have.

As for the minutes of the council meetings, all the meetings have been reported that have been turned in, and the minutes are on file for any citizen to read. What the mayor forgot to say in his letter to the editor, was that it is at least two weeks after a meeting before the newspaper receives them. Why?

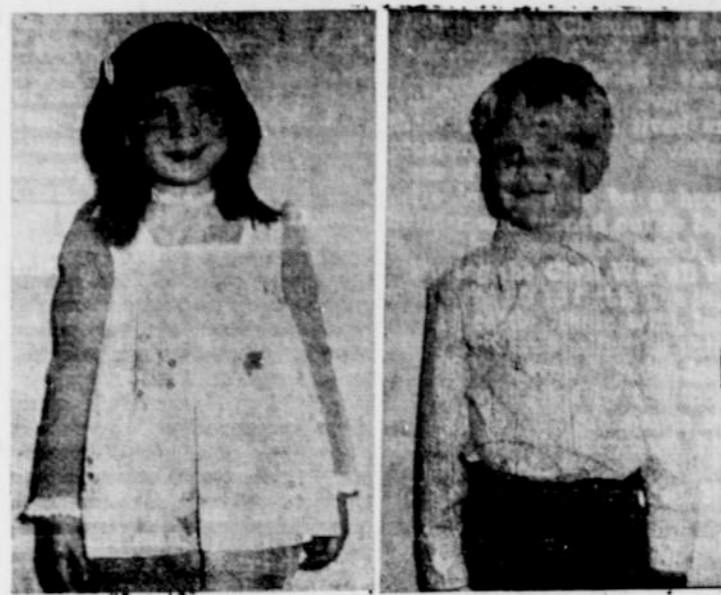

## Junior State Baseball Schedule Announced

The summer recreation program will again sponsor a Junior State Baseball program. Santiam was the winner of last year's minor division and appears to be a strong contender to repeat its performance this summer.

Returning from last year's team are pitchers Jim Wright and Rich Roth, both sporting records of four wins and one loss. Roth was the leading strikeout pitcher with 56, while Wright had 34. Returning to play in the infield is David Plotts at shortstop and one of the leading hitters last summer with a .452 mark. Supporting Plotts in the infield are Randy Roth (.417) playing at third base, Dan Legassie (.188) at second base, and Maurie Richards (.440) as catcher. Brian Jones, Rick Lady, Bob Fadenrecht and Brian Smith make up the outfield. Batting averages for these players indicate that they will contribute many runs for Santiam this season. Jones ended the season with a .333, Smith with a .385, and Lady with a .143. Fadenrecht and Ted Moreland are two new members for Santiam but both are counted on to strengthen the team. Moreland will probably be playing at first base, and Fadenrecht will also see duty as a catcher.

## Area Agencies Sponsoring June Activities

DETROIT — The Salem YMCA and the regional park recreation agency are co-sponsoring along with their regular activities, a program of outdoor recreation activities during the month of June.

All trips and activities will be supervised by trained personnel and are open to the general public. Participants are to sign up at the YMCA. Information on the programs is available there from Mike Smith, camping director.

The program will include a Jefferson Park wilderness back-packing and rock climbing institute June 7-9. Participants will hike into Jefferson Park in the Cascades from Santiam Pass Highway and will receive basic instruction in rock climbing techniques. It is open to all ages, including married couples.

Other activities include Willamette River float trip June 11. Silver Falls Park hike June 12. Participants must provide own transportation to Silver Falls Park for five-mile hike around the falls. Open to all ages.

Willamette River father-son canoe trip June 16-18. Marion Mountain hike June 19. Participants will drive to Marion Lake about five miles east of Marion Forks, then hike about 2.2 miles to the lake and then hike some six miles to the top of Marion Mountain. Open to all ages, no charge.

Siuslaw Forest coast hike June 25. Participants will drive to Neskowin Beach, hike through virgin timber area of Siuslaw National Forest. Open to all ages, no charge. Silver Falls overnight bicycle tour June 30-July 1. Planned mostly for teenagers and young couples.

## Small Glacial Lake Name Approved

DETROIT — According to a report, a proposal to name a small glacial lake in the Mt. Jefferson Wilderness Area after the late Oregon Governor Charles A. Sprague was approved over the weekend by the Oregon Geographic Names Board. The proposal will be forwarded to Washington, D.C. for final approval.

Lawrence E. "Bud" George, state highway division traffic engineer, who suggested naming the lake after Gov. Sprague, said approval of the national geographic names board would probably be announced in September. George said that the Oregon Geographic Names Board was "100 percent" for naming the lake in honor of Sprague but suggested a larger and more imposing landmark might also be named after the late publisher of the Oregon Statesman. The proposed Sprague Lake is an unnamed snow-fed lake about 200 feet wide located on the south shoulder of 7,200 foot Park Butte.

George said the names board at its summer meeting at Kah-nee-Ta Lodge at Warm Springs directed him and several other members to search for an imposing landmark in the Mt. Jefferson Wilderness Area, possibly a ridge of glacier on the mountain itself, to bear the name of Sprague.

They are to report at the board's December meeting in Portland.
