LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

TO THE CITIZENS OF MILL CITY:

On June 12, 1973, the voters of Mill City will be asked to go to the polls to vote on a proposed tax levy, outside the 8% limitation, of \$16,502.25. This is \$8,866.53 less than the levy this last year. The rate per thousand will be approximately \$4.29, which is \$9. lower than this last year.

How was this lowering of taxes accomplished? The Budget Committee, consisting of the council and the following six men: Frank Stromquist, Gale Dorothy, Clifford Crook, Charley Stewart, Fred Krecklow, and Rex Ohmart, worked on the proposed budget for four hours on the evening of April 12, 1973. Each item in the proposed budget was examined by the committee, led by Chairman John Willis, and recommendations were made. It was moved by Mr. Ohmart and second by Mr. Stromquist to pay one fourth of all salaries from Revenue Sharing Funds. After much discussion, this was passed by the committee. With increased revenues expected from sources other than taxes and the use of Revenue Sharing Funds, the people of Mill City will be able to vote for an unprecedented lowering of taxes. In a year when all other expenses are spiraling, the Budget Committee deserves a vote of thanks for this welcomed relief.

In a recent editorial in the Mill City Enterprise, it was stated that: "In recent weeks the local city council has held a number of special council meetings. Some of these have been reported, others have not." Why haven't some of these meetings been reported? Each meeting has received front page notice in the paper. Each meeting's minutes have been submitted to the newspaper for publication, at the discretion and editing of the publisher, but each meeting has not been attended and reported by a representative of the paper. Why?

It is especially noteworthy to point out that the meeting of May 23, so in discussion at this time, which received unfavorable comment in the editorial on the front page of the

May 31, 1973 Mill City Enterprise, was not attended by the writer of the editorial or any of his staff. Yet he felt that he could editorialize on second and perhaps biased information.

The facts in this matter stand for themselves. The budget as proposed at the April 12, 1973 budget meeting by the Budget Committee was accepted by the council and will be the proposals that the City will be asked to vote on June 12. The City Council is grateful for the dedication and long hours of service from

the purpose of challenging youth and adults with the gospel message of commitment to Jesus Christ.

His 11 is on a tour of the

committee which works as an advisory board for the citizens. The council is an elected body and held in direct responsibility to the citizens to represent them in managing the City's business in the most efficient and expedient manner. These men have the ultimate responsibility to this community.

On May 23, a special Revenue Sharing Supplemental Budget Meeting was held. This was announced in the newspaper with only three citizens attending.

The newspaper was not represented. The proposed supplemental budget is being published in this weeks paper and will be available, along with the regular budget documents at the City Recorder's office during her regular office hours. A public hearing on these supplemental proposals will be held Monday, June 25, 1973, at 7:30, at the City Hall. All citizens are welcome to come and express their opinions on these proposals, prior to adoption by the City Council.

It is sincerely hoped that each citizen of this community will take the time to inquire about these budgets and to study the documents and proposals for himself so that he will be able to satisfy himself, on first hand knowledge of the adequacy of the budgets. Each citizen has the right to decide for himself and not be led by rumors. See you at the polls on June 12.

\$166,700 in new equipment for better telephone service.

Mr. R. H. Knutson, Oregon state manager, announced today that installation work has begun on new equipment for the Sunnyside exchange central office. The new equipment will provide a substantial boost in capacity for the Sunnyside exchange. Upon completion of the installation, many customers will be able to obtain upgrading of their present telephone service, such as conversion to single-party telephone service.

The new equipment project is budgeted at \$166,700 and is part of an overall 1973 service improvement program totaling \$2,281,900. It is another step toward the company's long-term goal of providing single-party service to any and all customers requesting it.

Customers within the Sunnyside exchange may obtain more information on how this particular improvement project will affect their present telephone service by calling the company's business office. The project is expected to be completed by June 1, 1973.



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
