City Council Minutes

SPECIAL MEETING: May 30, 1973.

The meeting was called to order at 10:40 a.m. by Mayor Bate with Councilmen Brunner, Howell and Wills present. Councilmen Pfoertner and Phillips excused.

Councilman Howell proposed that the recorder's hours be changed to 9-12 a.m., and 1-3 p.m., Monday through Friday. After much discussion, it was decided to table the matter until after the budget vote.

Wes Jahn asked the city for \$3,000 in revenue sharing funds for a project to renovate the Frontier Inn swimming pool to use for open swimming and lessons this summer. He proposed that, in following years, the costs be split between the City of Gates and the City of Mill City and the summer recreation program. Councilman Howell stated that there were funds allocated for recreation in the revenue sharing proposals. The council was agreeable with the preliminary plans if an agreement could be reached with Mr. Nugent to work out some of the details and problems. A special meeting will be arranged later so the citizens can voice an opinion.

Moved by Brunner, seconded by Howell to change the traffic signs on intersection in front of Shell station and Charley Stewart's Grocery as proposed by the state and the chief of police recommendations. Passed with all aye votes.

The recorder read a letter from the steering committee. Moved by Wills, seconded by Brunner to OK a parade permit for the Fourth of July and supply police protection escort. Passed with all aye votes.

The recorder read a letter from Davis & Corderman regarding horse manure and unsightly messes on the city streets. The council agreed that the city would clean the messes if a complaint was made.

Moved by Howell, seconded by Brunner to accept Standard Insurance for \$10,000 insurance, required for the policemen by the state. Passed with all aye votes.

Moved by Brunner, seconded by Wills to retain the same auditor as in previous years. Passed with all aye votes.

Meeting adjourned: 11:30 a.m.

April Bank Debits Up

Bank debits for the sixteen reporting banks including Linn county were up in April, 1973, compared to April, 1972, the U of Oregon Bur. of Bus. and Economic Research has reported.

Debits for April, 1973, totaled \$14,848,000. For March, 1973, the total was \$124,326,000 and for April, 1972, the total was \$96,951,000.

Oregon with 413 reporting, had a percentage increase of 12.4 in April, 1973, as compared with March, 1973, and a 42.4% increase in April 1973, compared with April, 1972.

Total bank debits for April 1973, came to \$8,397,632,000. For March, 1973, the total was \$7,472,590,000 and for April, 1972, the total was \$5,898,264,000.

FLAG DAY, JUNE 14
