## City Council Hears from Citizens at Meeting Held Wednesday, June 13

The regular monthly Council meeting of June 13 was called to order at 8:05 p.m. by Mayor Bate with Councilmen Howell, Wills, and Pfoertner present. Councilmen Phillips and Brunner excused.

The minutes of the special meetings of May 16, May 22, and May 23 were read and approved.

The recorder read a letter from the Marion-Polk Boundary Commission.

Moved by Wills, seconded by Howell to pay the bills as read in the amount of \$2,085.46. Passed by a roll call vote with all eye votes.

Councilman Howell read the police report.

An amendment to Resolution #111 was read by the recorder. Moved by Howell, seconded by Wills to accept the amendment as read and forward to the Marion-Polk Boundary Commission as approved by the Council. Passed with all eye votes.

Wally Sinclair stimulated discussion by expressing his views on paving of streets and the proposed swimming pool renovation at the Frontier Inn in Gates. He asked the legality of using City funds for outside the City Limits. Councilman Wills stated that the City would not be running the pool, and the money would be given to the school summer recreation program. City Attorney Dennis Corderman stated that the Council could use the Revenue Sharing money for spending outside the City limits. George Long, Don Moffatt, and Steven Caham spoke in favor of the swimming pool.

Councilman Wills asked that future special meetings be held in the evenings so that the working man can attend.

Mr. Kostner complained that special meetings had not been adequately publicized. He asked the date that Ord. #119 was signed and was given the date of April 21, 1971. He also questioned the priority of street paving. Councilman Wills stated that the first streets to be paved this year would be the oldest and the ones deteriorating badly. He explained some of the history of street paving in Mill City.

Steve Caham reported some of the results of the Community Survey, which he said would be published soon. The order of importance given to problems needing the most immediate attention in the community was: 1. Sewers, with 80% writing this in; 2. Medical Health Care, and 3. Recreation and Education.

Mr. Caham explained some of his work in organizing local teens and some of the activities that have been planned by the teenagers. He invited everyone to attend the Health Fair, July 13 and 14. There will be a medical team from Sheridan, Wyo. and many local displays to promote health education and to find the local problems. He spoke in favor of trying to stimulate interest in attracting another doctor to this area.
