Canadian Elected Lions International President



OAK BROOK, ILLINOIS—Tris Coffin of Montreal, Quebec, Canada, was elected President of the International Association of Lions Clubs at the Association's 56th Annual Convention in Miami Beach, Florida. The Association is the largest service club organization in the world. It is a non-political, non-sectarian association with over one million members in clubs in 149 countries and geographic areas.

An optician, Coffin has been a member of the Montreal (Central) Lions Club since 1939. He and his family reside in Rosemere, a Montreal suburb.

President Coffin's theme for his year in office will be, "One Million Men Serving Mankind". Of his new responsibilities Coffin says, "Lionism is an organization that looks beyond the horizon, that seeks out the good in every man. Our goal is simple: to make the entire world a better, healthier, happier place where man can live in the spirit of peace and understanding".

Forest To Eliminate Log Scaling Stations

The Willamette National Forest no longer will rely on Forest Service scaling or measuring logs.

Effective July 1 the last four Forest Service scaling stations in the Blue River and Lowell Ranger Districts were turned over to the Columbia River Log Scaling and Grading Bureau.

"In view of the current National emphasis on increasing the efficient use of manpower and funds in the Federal government, we feel we can obtain immediate gains in accomplishing our timber production goals if we eliminate our scaling," said Forest Supervisor Zane G. Smith, Jr. A benefit to the timber industry, he said, would be the elimination of "double scaling." The Forest Service measurement traditionally has been valid only to base payments to the U. S. Government for the timber removed.

Industry needs associated with log grade determination, contractor payments and log resale necessitated a second scaling. Recognized as a "third party" scaling service, the Bureau now will provide the measurements for which timber purchasing payments to the U. S. are made.

Smith said the elimination of the Finn Rock and McKenzie ramps in the Blue River District, and the Unity and Fall Creek ramps in the Lowell District ends a long Forest Service management practice. "This marks the end of an era, but almost everyone concerned agrees that is a wise move," he said.

Eleven Forest Service employees are affected by the decision. Five of the men are now employed by the Columbia Bureau. Two men have retired, and four have taken other Forest Service positions. Approximately \$100,000 will be saved. Smith said these funds will be reprogrammed to strengthen environmental considerations related to timber sales and to accelerate long range planning affecting timber and other resources.
