A summary of traffic recorder data for rural and urban state highways showed an increase of 11.2 percent in vehicular traffic in April, 1973 compared to April, 1972.

The first four months of 1973 showed an increase of 10.5 percent in vehicular traffic compared to the first four months of 1972.
