Included in the picture page of last Saturday's Oregonian which showed various views of the Alcan Highway to Alaska was one of special interest to Herb and Lillian Peck, as two bicyclists in one of the pictures had visited them here last May. Charles Kelly recognized the names of Susan Byrne, 24, a nurse from Bishop, Calif., and Mike Cassidy, 25, also of that locality, having stopped at the post office here.

Pecks met the young couple by accident when they stopped at a roadside rest stop near Susanville, Calif. while on a trip to Reno last Spring and they struck up a casual conversation. Learning that they were on their way to Fairbanks, Alaska, by way of Alturas, Calif. they later returned from Reno that way, met them again, and decided to camp together.

About ten days later, the travelers rode through Mill City and were invited by the Pecks to have dinner with them and stay overnight which they gladly did. It was raining at the time, and a chance to dry out their clothes and take a hot bath was appreciated. Even their favorite tacos and refried beans were served to them for dinner.

It was learned that Susan Byrne had graduated in nursing, and that Mike Cassidy has had two years of college, served in the navy four years, and plans to return to college. Kellys Witness Scene of Crash

As Mr. and Mrs. Charles Kelly were driving home from Central Oregon Sunday afternoon, they came along shortly after a gyrocopter crashed on U. S. 20 at Hogg Rock about 15 miles west of Sisters. The two men who escaped injury in the accident were the pilot, Lyle Peters of Lebanon who is a light instructor with Albany Airways, and the owner of the plane, and Bob Silverdale of Albany.

The two men were flying from Albany to Redmond for the air show when their light aircraft encountered down-drafts over the mountain pass, and the highway was the only clear area in the vicinity. The plane was extensively damaged during the landing. Several vehicles were on the road as the aircraft landed, but all of them avoided the stricken plane. State police and a tow car had one lane of the highway blocked until the wreckage could be moved off as it was in the center of the highway.

A gyrocopter resembles a helicopter with its overhead rotor blades, but it has a

pusher-type propeller behind the pilot for thrust.

The Kellys were thankful they did not drive along somewhat earlier in the day.

**KNOW YOUR
TRAFFIC LAWS**
COMPILED BY THE OREGON TRAFFIC
SAFETY COMMISSION
Oregon law on Reckless
Driving states that any person who drives any vehicle upon a highway carelessly and heedlessly in willful and wanton disregard of the rights or safety of others is guilty of reckless driving and shall be punished:

(1) Upon conviction, by imprisonment in jail for not more than 90 days, or by a fine of not more than \$500, or both.

(2) Upon a second or subsequent conviction, the imprisonment can be up to six months and the fine can run as high as \$2,000.
