Apple-Stuffed Pork Chops

4 5-ounce pork chops, well trimmed
Salt, pepper and garlic powder to taste
1 medium apple, peeled, cored and sliced
3 cups chicken bouillon
1 cup cooked enriched rice
Dash onion salt
Dash poultry seasoning
1 teaspoon dehydrated onion flakes

Season chops with salt, pepper and garlic powder. Place on a rack and broil about 4 inches from heat until chops are brown on both sides. Remove from broiler. Core, slice and toss in a saucepan and cook until apples are tender. Drain, and place in mixing bowl. Add rice, cinnamon, poultry seasoning, onion flakes, salt and pepper to apples and mix thoroughly. Divide stuffing mixture into 4 even portions and place 1/2 of the stuffing on each chop. Bake at 375°F. about 15 to 20 minutes or until stuffing is brown. Makes 4 servings.
