Mrs. Flook was one of nine children, only three are still living, the oldest, the youngest and the middle one. All three of them were together Sunday for a family celebration.

She had three children, George "Si" Flook, who makes his home with his mother. Mrs. Robert (Gwendolyn) Johnson of Eugene and Jack Flook who passed away two years ago. She has three grandchildren and three great-grandsons.
