# **Overnight** Camping Declines in State

DETROIT - According to a report, overnight camping in Oregon's state parks the past summer declined from 1972, apparently reflecting a general drop in over all tourism in the state.

The state highway division said last week that overnight camping dropped 5.6% during the months of June through August. The biggest drop came in July which was 6.7% below the same month a year ago.


Camping in most state parks will close November 4, the division said. A few may close earlier if snow and cold weather set in. Although camping areas close, most parks remain open for day use where accessible

Seven overnight camps remain open all year. They are the coastal parks of Fort Stevens, Cape Lookout, Beverly Beach, Honeyman, Bullards Beach, Harris Beach and Valley of the Rogue south of Grants Pass.


