

*Anticoagulant therapy sharply reduces the incidence of stroke and subsequent residual neurological defects, according to a cooperative study by investigators in 12 V. A. Hospitals.

*Protein Deficiency during gestation and lactation not only stunts growth but also significantly increases susceptibility to tooth decay, in experiments by Drs. Juan Navia and Lewis Menaker, U. of Alabama Institute of dental research.

*Antibiotics and other drugs eventually may be processed by fermenting waste paper, according to a report in "Chemical & Engineering News. Experiments are underway at the U. S. Army Biological Research Labs, Natick, Mass.
