## Cross Country Team Places Third In Meet

Santiam has added a new sport to the extra-curricular program. It is cross-country.

Last week, Santiam placed third out of six in Santiam's third cross-country meet this season. The meet was held at Mt. Angel Seminary Wednesday, Oct. 17. The meet was won by Western Mennonite with 20 points, second was Jefferson with 53 points, and Santiam had 59 points.

The scoring system is quite different than that of other sports. The first five places of each team is totaled and the sum is the team's score. The team with the lowest score is declared the winner.

Floyd Peterman led the Santiam runners, collecting a second place. Other Santiam finishers were: Doug Babbitt, 10th; Chuck Hollinger, 13th; Gary DeMain 15th; Bill Tippet, 19th; Dale Wentz, 27th; and Don More, 38th. The field consisted of 38 runners from six schools.

Coach Mike McClain believed that his team's effort was the best so far this season.

Santiam's next meet will be at Western Mennonite at 4:30 on Oct. 24. This is Santiam's last meet before the state qualifying meet which will be held at Bush Park in Salem, on Oct. 31. If there are 1-3 teams participating in this meet, one team will go on to state; however, if 4-6 teams are entered, the top two teams will go to state. In either case, the top five individual finishers will go to the state meet.

## Road Closures To Affect Elk Hunters

Rocky Mountain elk hunters heading into eastern Oregon for the season opener on Oct. 27 will find partial road closures in effect in several popular hunting areas, according to state game director about 307,000 acres, are in co-John McKean.

The closures, which total operation with the U. S. Forest service and private landowners to boost the quality of hunting in several heavily roaded areas and improve conditions for the elk herds. Main traveled roads and most popular camping areas in all closures will remain open. Other roads and all off-road travel will be closed to motorized vehicles including motorcycles and snowmobiles. Roads that are closed will be well posted with signs.

The largest closure is in the 200,000-acre Chesnimnus Unit. It has also been in effect during the past two seasons. Hunters questioned as they checked into and out of the area indicated almost universal approval both years. Check-in or check-out of the Chesnimnus closure is not required this year.

Other closures are new. In most of them, roads proposed to be closed this year were posted last fall with signs to inform hunters of the projects.

Two closures are in the Ochoco National Forest, one an 83,000-acre unit in the Rager area and the other in a 12,500-acre parcel in the Burnt Cabin area.

A fourth closure covers 2,080 acres in the Shingle Gulch country adjacent to the game commission's Elkhorn Wildlife Management Area in the southern Starkey Unit.

DETROIT — Frank Lumber Co., Mill City, was the apparent successful bidder at \$1,630,256.42 for an estimated 7,100,000 board feet of Willamette National Forest timber, in the Bachelor Timber Sale, conducted at Detroit Ranger Station Tuesday morning.

The firm bid \$244 per thousand for an estimated 3400 MBF of Douglas Fir, advertised at \$113.89 per thousand for an estimated 3700 MBF of Noble Fir and other coniferous species, advertised at \$91 per thousand.

Included in the sale, was 99 acres of all species of logs which sold at the appraised value of \$201.58 per acre. There were eight qualified bidders. The stand is located approximately ten miles south of Idanha via Coppers Ridge Road to Bruno Meadows Road.
