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## Salem Scene

### MYSTERIES OF TROJAN SOLVED FOR VISITORS

A modest concrete building 42 miles north of Portland on Highway 30 has an odds-on chance of becoming Oregon's busiest tourist attraction.

But it wasn't necessarily planned that way. The reason for the bright orange structure's impending popularity lies in the fact it stands in the shadow of the state's most imposing man-made landmark.

The landmark is the 499-foot high cooling tower for the Trojan nuclear power plant and the Halloween-colored tourist attraction houses the electrical generating facility's visitors' information center. It opens to the public on Sat., Nov. 10.

Trojan won't start generating electricity in time to ease the Pacific Northwest energy crisis this winter. Its 1,130,000 kilowatts won't become part of the region's hard-pressed pool of electrical power before September 1975.

But the visitors' information center likely will host upwards of a million guests before the initial kilowatt flows from Trojan.

Planners and owners of the \$354 million Trojan facility

early recognized the need for public education regarding benefits of electric power generated by nuclear fission. But, events subsequent to Trojan's conception have pressed the subject of public information into a forefront priority.

Owned jointly by Portland General Electric Co., the Eugene Water and Electric Board and Pacific Power & Light, Trojan's attraction for the public stemmed early from the fact it will be Oregon's first nuclear powered generating facility. The newness of the project — combined with its size — were bound to attract attention.

After all, said a PGE spokesman, the cooling tower is so huge the First National Bank's 44-story tower in Portland would fit inside and barely peek over the top.

Then came the environmental controversy — ranging all the way from an imagined threat to winter headquarters of migrating whistling swans to timidity regarding proximity of an atom-splitting facility to the state's largest population center.

There followed a year's long controversy involving federal, state and local government restrictions on Trojan's construction and operation. The Oregon Legislature enacted laws regulating siting of nuclear plants and disposal of their waste. Federal regulations covered the entire subject with an intricate overlay of restrictions.

One by one, each hurdle in the path of the project's completion was cleared. Ground was broken, a workforce as large as a thousand men at a time began work on the 634-acre site near Rainier on the west bank of the Columbia River and progress continued in spite of work stoppages, legal intervention and shortages of materials.

Public curiosity increased apace as each objection was overcome. And then came murmurs of the present regional power shortage and public interest in Trojan attained new heights.

The Trojan information center opens next month on the crest of an interest wave that appears likely to increase in direct proportion with the diminution of electrical power. And nobody's forecasting an electrical energy surplus in the near future.

It is designed to accommodate 500,000 visitors annually and will be open from 9:30 a.m. until 5 p.m. daily and from 1 p.m. until 5 Sundays. No simple chronicle of the project's development from ground-breaking to initial atom splitting, the information center offers a show and exhibits of worlds fair caliber.

Situated across a reflecting pond from the project's reactor, generator and cooling tower, it contains intricate audio-visual exhibits tracing man's emergence into the Age of the Atom. Complex theories of physics, mathematics and chemistry are appealingly reduced to lay comprehension.

A startling multi-media experience awaits those who visit the darkness of the "Ecosphere" and suddenly find themselves in the midst of an explosion of sight and sound. The story of man's dependence upon energy unfolds and members of the audience emerge feeling more like participants than spectators.

Completing the educational concept of the 4,800 square-

foot center's informational facility is a battery of computer teaching machines upon which the visitors can test his own comprehension of what he has seen and heard.

Constructed at a cost in excess of \$2 million, the visitor information center is only a first step in the process of acquainting Trojan and nuclear fission with its neighbors. Once completed, many facilities will be open to public inspection via guided tours.

Trojan's proponents long have trumpeted the benefits of electric power as one of the best tools with which to improve and sustain man's natural environment. Restricted by dwindling supplies of other sources with which to generate electricity — and hampered by a temporary lack of technology sufficient to stave off greater energy shortages in the immediate future — it would appear Trojan and sister projects will become part of our way of life.

A visitor to the site quite likely will make acceptance of this new neighbor — and those yet to come — lots easier for those older and more timid among us.

And as far as youngsters are concerned, they'll probably eat it up!
