

Oral Hygiene Project Starting

The Oregon State Health Division (OSHD) dental health section is assisting in the initiation of an oral hygiene program for the Mill City schools. The objective of this program is to teach the students techniques to remove the decay-causing substance called "plaque" from their teeth and thus improve the oral health of the students.

The initial phase will include grades 4, 5 and 6 of Mill City Elementary School. On Oct. 31 these classes will be given instruction on proper brushing and the use of dental floss. The teacher-supervised brushing and flossing program will continue for five weeks, after which its effectiveness will be evaluated. Assisting with the instruction is Mrs. Kay Blundell of the OSHD dental health section, Mrs. Marion Schaeffer, Linn County public health nurse, and Dr. Dave Thompson, Mill City dentist and his staff.
