Medical Missionary Presbyterian Church Speaker

Dr. Robert Sandilands, a medical missionary to the Cameroon in Africa for the past 27 years, was the guest speaker at the Presbyterian Church Sunday morning. He was accompanied by his wife, Maria, who is a registered nurse and helps him in his work. They are at present on leave at their home in Salem, as Dr. Sandilands recently underwent foot surgery and his wife is under medical treatment, but they hope to return for one more term. Of their five children, four are connected with the medical profession. They have three grandchildren, and are expecting two more in the near future.

Connected with the "personal interest program", in which the local church participates, Dr. Sandilands spoke interestingly of his mission to the natives in Biafra which is in the northern part of the Cameroon. There are numerous language groups, but only one political party, so everyone casts "yes" voter at the elections, making the African democracy really Authoritarian. Since 1961, Independence Day is celebrated on Jan. 1 each year.

The missionaries are actually called fraternal Christian workers now, according to Dr. Sandilands, who performs many surgical operations along with his work almost with assembly line precision due to the shortage of space and equipment. The average rainfall is 17 feet annually, so they felt quite at home here the past month. There seems to be no lack of food in Biafra, but there are many patients who suffer from lack of protein, and malaria is the number one problem as the mosquitoes breed prolifically in the dampness.

During the coffee hour following morning worship, Dr. Sandilands showed many color slides of his mission, the medical facilities, religious services, the friendly natives, various surgical patients, and a trip to a remote village by helicopter. The Sandilands returned to Oregon on June 19 and the leave was extended due to their medical problems.
