

# **Pharmacy Topics**

\*Millions of Americans suffered during the 1968-69 flu epidemic, and it could happen again. This time, though instead of A-2, a new strain of the bug, called (by the National Center for Disease control) B-Hong Kong-5-72, may appear. It's a virtually new virus against which most persons have no natural immunity. But while in 1968 a protective vaccine was not available until late in the season, pharmaceutical houses already have ammunition on hand for B-Hong Kong-5-72. One more change: a single shot used to give protection against A and B influenza; you'll need two injections now, one of which contains specific antibodies to com-

bat the new flu. The FDA has ordered the nation's bakeries to double the iron content of white bread, beginning in April, 1974, because studies show that Americans don't get enough iron in their diet. But the medical profession is criticizing the order on the grounds that research thus far doesn't prove that more iron in bread is effective or even safe.

### Fuel Conservation Starts In The Home

The heating and cooling of buildings requires about one sixth of the total energy expended in the United States. Much of this energy is wasted because buildings are so poorly insulated that heat is lost in winter and air conditioning equipment runs overtime in summer. This applies to most older homes and commercial buildings, and surprisingly, occurs in many new structures as well, the new structures as well, the researchers find,

Wasted energy may cost the nation as much as two billion dollars annually.

Insulation specialists at the Construction Products Division of W.R. Grace & Co., Cambridge, Massachusetts — one of the nation's largest producers of insulating mateproducers of insulating materials—point out that such things as better home insulation, storm windows and more efficient heating and cooling units can greatly reduce fuel costs. Savings can amount to over \$100 a year in the average size home.

It is estimated 50% of homes 15 years old or older have no insulation at all and nearly all homes are inade-quately insulated by today's

As with almost everything else, fuel costs for the consumer have been rising and are expected to continue in the future. Fuel economists predict that the price for gas, electricity and heating oil will increase at an expect will increase at an annual average rate of about eight per cent. At this rate, fuel prices will double in ten vears





Make sure your house is well caulked around windows, doors, ctc.—anywhere "air leakage" can occur. 3. Insulate the attic floor. This can save up to \$100 in yearly fuel bills. 4. Run air conditioners at a comfortable level - don't "over-cool".

Check insulation. Attics should have a six inch layer of good insulation, and walls three and one-half inches. Floors located over "crawl spaces" also need three and one-half inches.

### Income Tax Consultants Need New State License to Practice

The whole idea is to make sure only persons qualified by experience and continuing education will be allowed to do do tax work next year for the personal income tax work for others.

Although it estimated 2,500 persons would have to be licensed, the new tax service examiners' board found it couldn't get a list of tax consultants and preparers from the state income tax offices or anywhere else. The feeling is there may be many hundreds "out there" due for a shock if they find out too late they need a license, maybe even an examination.

Attorneys, public accountants, certified public accountants don't have to get licenses.

Other persons planning to first time or after a lapse of over a year must not only get a license but also must pass an examination.

After the initial signup of tax preparers and tax consultants this Jan. 1, any new applicatint will have to show 60 hours of instruction in tax law, theory and practice. Renewal applicants will have to show 80 hours of instruction in the preceding three years.
