Rights of Grandparents

Do grandparents have a legal right to the companionship of their grandchildren? Consider the tale of woe brought into court by an elderly couple.

"Since our daughter died, relations with our son-in-law have gone from bad to worse. Lately he won't let their little boy come to visit us, or even let us go to visit him. Surely we have a right to see our own grandchild."

But the court refused to come to their aid. The court said that since the father had legal custody, he alone could decide whom the child should see.



This is the usual rule — that grandparents have no independent right, against parental wishes, to spend time with their grandchildren. However, courts have held the other way if the child's own welfare is clearly at stake.

For example: Custody of two little girls in a divorce case was awarded to their mother. At the time, she did not object to giving visitation privileges to the father's parents, since the children had a long and loving relationship with them.

Later, she changed her mind and tried to end these visits with the grandparents. But this time, a court ruled — for the sake of the children — that the contact should not be broken off.

"To have suddenly severed this close blood tie of love and affection," said the court, "might well have caused emotional disturbance."

Furthermore, there is always the possibility that grandparents can take over full-time custody by proving that the parent is no longer a fit person to be in charge.

Thus, in another case, the grandparents of a three-year-old boy were able to show that his mother was of frequent intoxication and immorality.

The court switched custody to them outright. The boy would be better off not merely to visit, said the court, but to move right in.

Skie Areas Doing Brisk Business

DETROIT — According to a report, the first Sunday of gas station closures appeared to have little effect on patronage of Pacific Northwest Ski Resorts, according to a survey by Northwest Skiers Service. The report says, a few managers reported their business off just slightly, but this was balanced by others who said more than the normal number were skiing on their mountains.

Since Pacific Northwest ski areas opened much earlier than usual this winter, it is difficult to compute a real base from which to judge increase or decrease, the report says.

Skiers did not expect to find gasoline available, but a few gas stations were open in or around ski areas, so those who did not fill up early, or made plans to cover situations, were generally able to find gas for their return trips.

The report says most managers believe skiers will find a way to keep up with their sport through car-pooling or some form of public transportation, if the gas shortage worsens. Those who have public transportation are trying to better schedules and those without are trying to obtain it.

To help with fuel shortage problems, Hoodoo Ski Bowl in the Santiam Pass area has consolidated its operations to a Thursday through Sunday schedule, except for the holiday periods when the lifts will run everyday.

Hoodoo's snow cover remains unusually high with a total of 79 inches of snow as of Sunday.

Wolverines Down Amity Warriors

The Santiam Wolverines opened their home season with an impressive win over the Amity Warriors, 57-27, Tuesday, Dec. 4.

Santiam took a commanding 33-10 half time lead, allowing only three field goals. In the second half, a Santiam zone defense confused the Warriors as they had no field goals in the third quarter. Amity's hopes for controlling Santiam with a full court press failed as the Wolverines easily broke it.

Fouls played an important part of the game as Amity collected 28 fouls. Santiam converted 21 of 35 foul shots for 60%. Santiam only fouled 15 times, giving Amity only 15 foul shots. Santiam had twice as many field goals as Amity, 18-9, and Amity shot a poor 18% from the floors.

The Wolverines were led by Frank Bryant, Gary DeMain and David Plotts. Frank Bryant led the Wolverines in scoring with 14 points and in rebounds with nine. Gary DeMain was Santiam's second leading scorer with ten points, eight in the second half. David Plotts collected eight points, and led Santiam in assists with five, and steals with four.

Santiam J.V.'s Hold Amity To 34 Points

The Santiam J.V.'s held Amity to only 12 points in the second half, while scoring 25 points to come from behind to defeat Amity 41-34 in a non-league basketball game at Mill City, Dec. 4.

The Wolverines only scored 16 points in the first half, while Amity scored 22, as Santiam had trouble breaking Amity's zone defense. However, Santiam went into a zone defense in the second half and controlled the tempo of the game. Santiam outscored Amity 3-7 in the third quarter to knot the score 29-29 going into the final quarter. Santiam held Amity to only five points in the fourth quarter to win.

Santiam was led by Mike Morgan. He collected 17 points, 13 in the second half, and pulled down 12 rebounds to lead in both categories. Jack Loftin and David Etzel were right behind Mike in rebounds as they collected ten and eight rebounds respectively. Jim Cine, who was instrumental in the comeback, led his team in assists with three.

Santiam dominated the stats as they outscored Amity 43-22. Santiam also had seven more field goals and shot a better percentage from the floor.

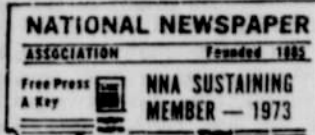
