The corporation would drain away skilled employees from private oil companies. 3. -The petroleum industry is already hampered by a shortage of drilling rigs and tubular goods to carry on exploratory dilling and production. If a government corporation entered the field and compete for scarce drilling supplies, this would only mean a further reduction of activity by private enter-prise. 4.—The existance of a government oil corporation would discourage investment in private companies which need all the capital they can get for exploration efforts and the construction of more refin-
