Two Timber Sales Scheduled At Detroit Ranger Sta.

DETROIT — Two timber sales with an estimated 22,600,000 board feet of Wallamette National Forest timber are slated to be sold at Detroit Ranger Station April 5.

Sealed bids will be received for the two sales at the office of the Detroit District Ranger up to and not later than 10:00 a.m. on that date. Oral bidding will follow the opening of the bids at 10:00 a.m. Both sales will include acreage of "all species of logs" which the bidder is required to purchase.

Largest of the two sales is the Woodpecker Number Three timber sale with an estimated 17,200,000 board feet of federal timber. The sale involves 15,700 MBF of Douglas Fir advertised at \$129.08 per thousand, 1,500 MBF of Western Hemlock and other coniferous species advertised at \$92.50 per thousand, and 233 acres of all species of logs advertised at \$308.42 per acre. Western Hemlock and other coniferous species and the acreage of all species of logs will be sold at fixed rates.

The sale is located approximately eight miles east of Idanha via Road 1054.

The Timber Butte No. Two timber sale located approximately eight miles northeast of Idanha via Road 1071 has an estimated 5,400,000 board feet of timber. It consists of 2,700 MBF of Douglas Fir advertised at \$87.79 per thousand and 2,700 MBF of Western Hemlock and other coniferous species advertised at \$47.36 per 1,000. Included in the sale is 231 acres of all species of logs advertised at \$4.56 per acre. The acreage will be sold at a fixed rate.

School To Pave New Pathway Soon

The Linn County School District #129J held their regular meeting on Monday, March 11, at the Santiam High School. The change was due to the school's team going to Class A Basketball Tournament. The meeting began at 8:08 p.m. with Robert Levon, William Morgan (chairman), David Barnhart, Wesley Jahn and Edna Ross present.

The reading of the minutes of the previous Feb. 14 meeting were dispensed with.

Action taken involved the decision of the board to have the pathway across the Seventh-Day Adventist Church property leveled and blacktopped at a cost of \$500. Money is to be used from this year's budget funds.

The board decided that tax monies received from Marion County Treasurer to the individual districts will be on a monthly basis rather than the existing quarterly basis. The thought was that the school would then have better knowledge of where and how much money existed.

It was noted that an electric hot water heater would be installed this summer in the home economics room to insure hot water for the classes. This has been a problem in the past.

A decision by the board was made to trade-in the existing 8-year old John Deere Grass Mower onto a Ford grass mower. Ford will give the school district a 25% discount plus approximately \$700 trade-in value. The new mower will cost approximately \$2000 before trade-in. Increasing repairs on the old mower prompted the action.

A formal notice of resignation was received by the board from Mrs. Joe Bowes. She has devoted many years of teaching to the school district and has decided to retire. The board accepted her resignation.

Repair work on the large house owned in Gates was decided by the board. Work consists of having the sink and counter tops replaced, two bedrooms carpeted and this summer a window replaced with a wall. Money will come from the district housing (rent) fund and is available.

A motion was made to pay the bills.
