State May Get Funds from Stockbroker Deal

DETROIT—According to a report, Oregon hopes to realize about \$80,000 from the sale assets of convicted Salem stockbroker Harold Smithers, said Del Weaver, attorney for the Oregon Corporation Commission. The funds will help repay losses estimated at \$900,000 to the four surviving victims of Smithers, who is serving a year in jail for 11 counts of federal securities law violations.

Smithers, 52, plead guilty in January and was sentenced to six months at the Multnomah County maximum security institution in Troutdale, plus another half year term in a community treatment center. Smithers was accused of converting to his own use money from his clients' mutual fund accounts.

Most of the loss will be paid by the Fireman's Fund Insurance group which held the surety bonds for Smithers' employer, First California Co. The state has in receivership property owned by Smithers.

According to the report, the bulk of the \$80,000 will come from the sale of a fancy compound of building at Detroit, near the lake. The complex is appraised at \$65,000, the report says.

The state inventory list compiled also shows Smithers owned a \$45,000 beach condominium at Otter Rock plus the family ranch at Salem.

Outdoor vehicles and equipment comprise many pages of the Smithers inventory, according to the report.

State Purchases Highway Sign from N. Santiam C. of C.

Gary Ruch, right of way agent for the State Highway department attended the Wednesday noon board meeting of the North Santiam Chamber of Commerce. Ruch brought with him a proposition for the State to purchase the Chamber sign which has been located on the east side of Pacific Highway near Salem. The offered \$1,860 for the sign and agreed to stand the expense of removal. After discussion by the board members present it was decided that the sign had served its purpose and agreed to sell it to the State. The State is purchasing signs along the right of way to comply with their highway beautification program.

There was some discussion on some other means of advertising on the highway. Jerry Coffman is going to look into these and report at a later meeting. Coffman will also be master of ceremonies at the annual installation banquet which will be held at Santiam Golf course on June 18. The banquet committee is asking that those planning to attend call in for reservations 859-2878 or 769-9340 on or before June 15.

Timber Sales Slated at Detroit

DETROIT — Two timber sales, with an estimated 18,700,000 board feet of Willamette National Forest timber will be conducted at Detroit Ranger station June 26.

Sealed bids will be received by the Detroit District Ranger up to and not later than 10 a. m. on the above date. Both sales have an acreage of all species of logs which the bidder is required to purchase. Oral bidding will follow the opening of the sealed bids at 10 a. m.

Largest of the two sales is the Mansfield Intermediate with an estimated 13,500,000 board feet of federal timber. The sale, located approximately 10 miles northeast of Detroit Ranger station consists of 10,700 MBF of Douglas Fir advertised at \$107.97 per thousand, and 2,800 MBF of Western Hemlock and other coniferous species advertised at \$60.02 per 1,000. Included in the sale is 502 acres of all species of logs advertised at \$111.75 per acre. The western hemlock and other coniferous species and the acres of all species of logs will be sold at a fixed rate.

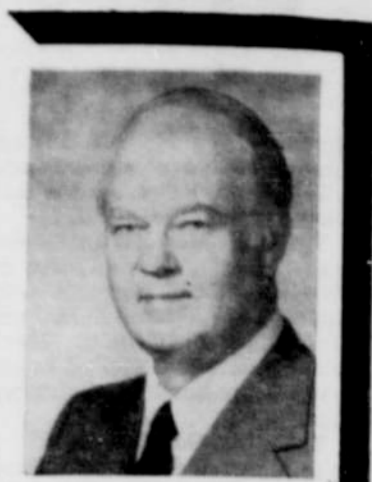
Fox Creek Ridge No. 2 timber sale has an estimated 4,700,000 board feet of timber. The sale, located approximately 10 miles north of Detroit involves 3,700 MBF of Douglas Fir advertised at \$116.10 per thousand and 1,000 MBF of Western Hemlock and other coniferous species advertised at \$73.50 per thousand. Included in the sale is 96 acres of all species of logs advertised at \$202.85 per acre.

The acres of all species of logs will be sold at a fixed rate.
