Pharmacy Topics

In an article written by Dr. Lincoln Chin, Salt and baking soda . . . the household favorites to induce vomiting following accidental poisoning, can actually become the killer rather than the poison itself. He cites a number of cases where poisoning victims died as a result of the advised first aid treatment. . . their deaths stemming from toxic salt reactions. Here is what happens: "We are told to use salt or baking soda mixed with water to make the victim vomit. We expect them to work and they don't, so more and more of the solution is added until sodium poisoning is induced instead of vomiting."

Dr. Chin recommends that a water suspension of activated charcoal stored in a tightly sealed jar be kept in the home medicine cabinet for first aid purposes. The activated charcoal absorbs the poison in the intestinal tract. Ipecac is the best for inducing vomiting, but should not be used in all cases. Contact your doctor the first thing before using ipecac.
