It Ain't All Roses

Since last Thursday there has been many changes in the administration in Washington D. C. We cannot help but express sorrow and dismay at circumstances leading to the resignation of a President of the United States.

However, there is a positive side to an event that at first appears tragic in every detail. Americans everywhere should rejoice in the fact our system — our democratic way of life — has been sustained and no person, no matter how high his office, can usurp the power that belongs to the people and their elected representatives.

A president has resigned under fire and amidst charges, many of which may never be resolved. Nevertheless the system prevails and under Gerald Ford and his successors, whatever their party, it will continue to improve providing both freedom and opportunity to all on a scale never before matched in the history of man.

From an economic standpoint, resolution of this conflict cannot help but provide stimulus for activity that has slowed during a period of tension and indecision.

Out of all the confusion and the apparent transgressions of a few, the business community in particular should expend new efforts — within clearly defined guidelines — in its continuing program of partnership with government for the mutual benefit of all.

There is a scent of change in the wind with the arrival of the last golden moments of Labor Day. For Americans this final three-day summer holiday barely fade into memory when Autumn moves in, turning our thoughts away from watermelon, tennis and the like.

Suddenly, it is time to head back to school, and a new whirl of sports and homework will fill the evenings. As the youngsters tackle the classroom with renewed vigor, the adults will hopefully head into the season with a sense of re-dedication to the principles of good, honest work. Today, as during the first commemoration of Labor Day in 1882, the importance of the working-man and woman's efforts deserve recognition. Their hard work makes a high standard of living a reality for their families and country.

Labor Day, September 2, 1974, can be a day of new beginnings for all of us. How we respond to the challenges around us will decide how successful we are in attaining our goals — whether educational or career-oriented.

Soviet tractors are now being distributed to American farmers through U. S. farm equipment dealers, according to an Associated Press dispatch. This means that essential food and fiber production will depend in part upon utilization of Russian tractors. If the trend continues, the United States will be in the uncomfortable position of depending upon foreign imports of machinery to maintain food production. Moreover, the foreign machinery will very likely be dependent upon foreign oil imports for fuel.

Many reasons and excuses will be given for faltering American production and competitive ability. In the case of the Russian tractors, one U.S. farmer who now owns a Soviet machine says, "... An American tractor like this one would cost you about \$7,000; their price is \$5,600. And when you buy an American tractor, you go on a six-month waiting list..." After all the excuses and explanations, the fact remains that this country is leaning more and more on foreign productivity for its existence. Behind the rationalizations for what is happening lies the cold fact that many years of derogatory, punitive and even cynical antibusiness policies and attitudes in America are taking their toll.

National Bank, was at the Mill City Branch Tuesday morning to award recognition to Mrs. Clyde (Colleen) Morgan, Mrs. Joe (Jeannine) Lalack and Mrs. Ralph (Shari) Spurgeon as "Certified Bank Tellers." These three were among the 17 girls statewide who qualified and passed the exam required before receiving the recognition.

To acquire "certified" status, an applicant must have a minimum of two years as a teller with the bank and complete four 10 course programs compiled by the American Institute of Banking which requires class attendance one night a week for 12 weeks and passing the examination at the completion of the course. The above is in addition to fulfilling certain other internal requirements and a written exam supervised by the education department of the U. S. Bank, covering basic operational, auditing and marketing components of the tellers job.

Timber Sale Set At Detroit for August 27th

DETROIT—Sealed bids will be received at the office of the Detroit District Ranger Station up to and not later than 10 a. m., August 27, for an estimated 13,800,000 board feet of Willamette National Forest timber in the Pinnacle Lost Timber sale.

The sale, located approximately 10 miles west of Highway 22 via Parrish Lake road consists of 6,800 MBF of Douglas Fir advertised at \$137.13 per thousand, and 7,000 MBF of Western Hemlock and other coniferous species advertised at \$74.36 per 1,000.

Included in the sale is 323 acres of all coniferous species of logs advertised at \$240.84 per acre which the bidder is required to purchase. The acreage of all coniferous species will be sold at advertised fixed rates.

City of Lyons To Hold Election Soon

LYONS—The main business at the meeting of the City Council Wednesday night, August 7, was to approve a direct line toll free to the Sheriff's office in Albany. This will be in conjunction with Mill City and Scio who have approved it, possibly with a Lyons number, as soon as approved by the PUC and telephone company.

Application will be made for flood insurance which will be available to the city.
