

One Giant Leap For Mankind

On Sunday, July 20, 1969, American astronauts Neil Armstrong and Edwin Aldrin became the first men to walk on the moon. The plaque they left, "for all mankind," marized the goals and ideals of America's space program.


Today, five years after the greatest technological achievement in history, millions of people around the world have benefited from the scientific advancement and practical application of this new body of knowledge. Billions of dollars have

been saved as man has learned to monitor weather, pollution and plant disease on a worldwide basis. Satellite photography enables a farmer to pinpoint a crop-destroying disease and control it before se-

rious damage can result. Satellites give early warnings of severe weather never before possible. And satellite monitoring gives a global view air and water pollution. Now pollution sources can be pinpointed and the movement of pollutants mapped. In addition, air monitoring equipment developed for the Apollo spacecraft is now in use in ground level pollution detection stations.

A more visible benefit of the space program is the improvement in communications made possible by the satellite. International television comes frequently into the American home, and there is the even greater benefit of cheaper and more reliable long-range telephone communication.

No science has benefited more from the space program than medicine. Through methods developed to monitor the heartbeats of astronauts in space, remote electrocardiography now can constantly monitor heart patients or



broadcast EKG information to a hosptal emergency room ahead of ambulance arrival.

Space technology is being used in hundreds of medical procedures from cancer research to devices for aiding the handicapped.

Meanwhile, new commer cial products which had their beginning in the space program are making life easier, safer and more comfortable

Nonflammable fabrics and paints reduce the danger of fire. New methods of food packaging and new concentrated high-energy foods pro-vide nutritional benefits. Super insulations, developed for use in space, are used in sleeping bags and sportsmen's apparel and may soon provide energy conserving building in-

The list of products continues on and on. From digital clocks to minicomputers, from improved batteries to better clothing, the benefits of space can be purchased in any department store.

And we have only begun. Rockwell International Corporation is now developing the Space Shuttle orbiter for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

The Shuttle, which will take off like a rocket and return from orbit to land like an airplane, will multiply the already innumerable benefits of space exploration.

Transporting people, satellites and even entire scientific laboratories into earth orbit will become nearly as com-monplace as today's international airline flights.

The reusable Shuttle, which will make hundreds of trips into orbit, will greatly reduce the cost of each space flight from previous programs in which vehicles were used only

The benefits of the space program have been abundant. The Shuttle can refine and multiply them making space a catalyst for a better world 'for all mankind."
