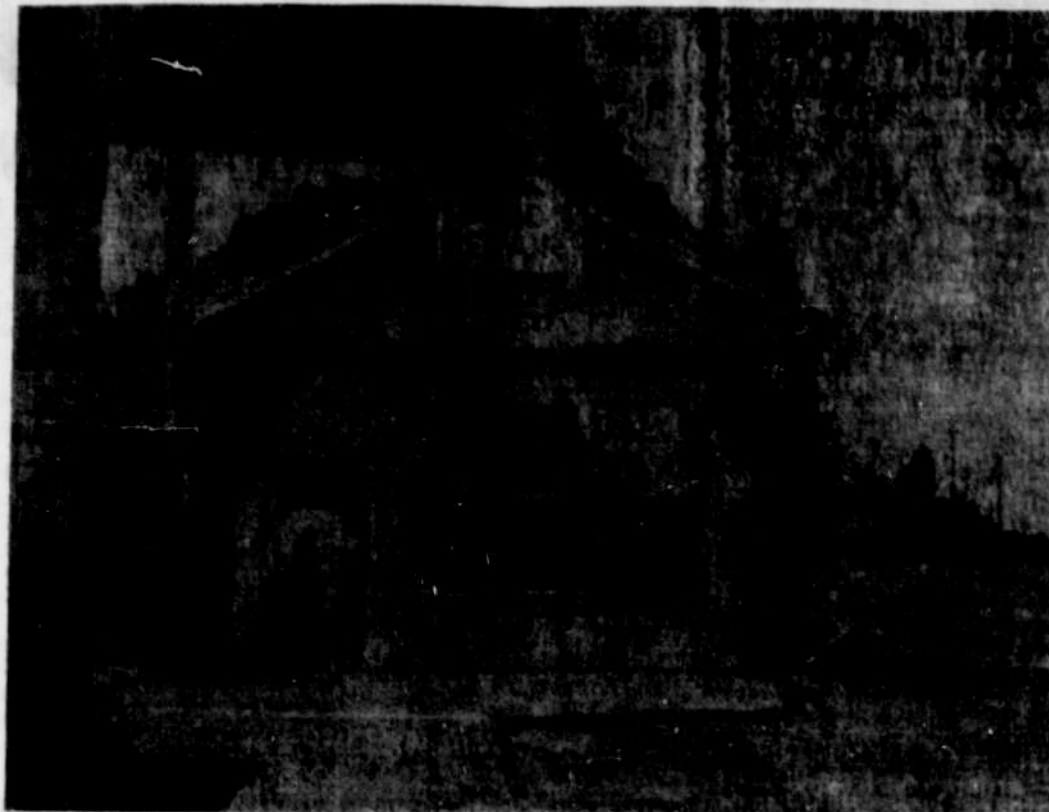

Local Artist Chosen To Paint With Pellew This Summer



Mrs. Leo Poole received word that she has been accepted by John C. Pellew to paint in his two week workshop held in Colorado this summer. Mr. Pellew is one of the best known contemporary American artists — a versatile painter in watercolor, acrylics, and oil. The winner of many distinguished awards, his work has been included in major national art exhibits since 1934 and is represented in the permanent collections in The Metropolitan Museum of Art, The Brooklyn Museum, The Union Cultural, Sao Paulo Brazil; and numerous other leading galleries and museums

throughout the country. He is a member of the National Academy of Design, The Allied Artists of America, The American Watercolor Society, and The Salmagundi Club. Mr. Pellew has won more than 45 top awards including the Silver Medal American Watercolor Society, 1970, and the Allied Artists Gold Medal for Watercolor.

Mrs. Poole will leave for Colorado in June to join the group working under Mr. Pellew. The group will paint in various areas — from ghost towns to the Colorado Rockies.

Mrs. Poole expressed that she enjoys painting various

subject matter. She especially likes to paint buildings and landscape in the Mill City area.

The oil painting shown here is one she executed of the old shoe shop — to capture a time in Mill City history. The tracks to the right of the building serve as a reminder that the structure was once a depot. Remember the barber shop?

Sue submitted photographs of some of her oil paintings to be juried. During the workshop, she hopes to improve her technique in composition, concentrating on the initial abstract pattern.
