Burning Allowed Next Two Months

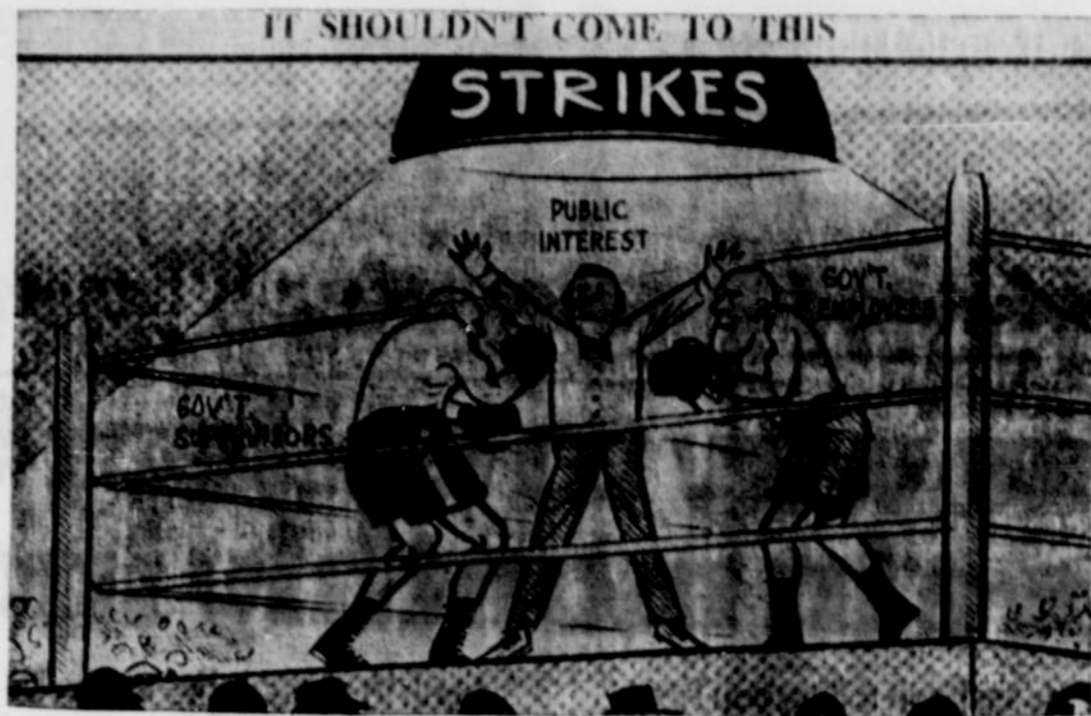
Residential backyard burning and landclearing burning will be permitted during April and May, the Mid-Willamette Valley Air Pollution Authority announced recently. A fire permit is required and may be obtained from local fire departments. Ph. 897-3160. Burning may be prohibited on certain days during these months if air quality would suffer, said M. D. Roach, director of the authority. Landclearing burning is prohibited within city limits and all commercial and industrial burning is still prohibited.

Regulations restrict the time for burning to one hour after sunrise to one-half hour before sunset. Prunings must be air dried for 30 days and it is illegal to burn garbage, asphalt, rubber, plastic, wet leaves, green grass clippings or any material that causes excess smoke or obnoxious odor. Civil penalties may be imposed for violation of these regulations. These regulations affect Benton, Linn, Marion, Polk and Yamhill counties. Public hearings regarding these regulations are being held in each county to receive citizen comment on the burning periods. However, no regulation revision can be expected before June.

Since 1947, the number of Americans employed by federal state and local governments has more than doubled. One out of every U. S. nonagricultural workers today—more than 14.2 million—is publicly employed. Between 1962 and 1969, public civilian monthly payrolls at all levels expanded by more than 100%. Today, they stand in excess of \$7 billion.

State laws are nearly unanimously prohibiting strikes by government workers. Yet, in 1972, 375 strikes idled 142,000 government workers nationwide for better than 1.2 million work-days—up from 42 strikes costing 146,000 work-days and involving 11,900 workers in 1965.

The problem is worsening. Some prominent labor spokesmen are backing proposed legislation asking congress to authorize mandatory union membership for every government employee. This proposal would authorize public sector strikes as a matter of course. The right of employees in private industry to engage in collective bargaining to resolve labor-management differences and to reinforce their demands by striking is generally accepted.

In contrast, the government employee has chosen to serve only one interest—the public interest. That interest is ill-served by disruptive strikes and wage demands which often would violate the public trust if granted.

New Park Rules Are Now In Effect

DETROIT — According to a report, pets brought into state parks will have to be kept on leashes no longer than six feet under new park rules approved Monday of this week by state transportation commission. The commission rule also imposes some new fees, including charges for group picnics and for firewood. Dogs, cats and other pets will have to be kept on leashes no longer than six feet, previously there was no minimum on leash length, the report says the state will begin charging for firewood at a rate of 50 cents for two cubic feet in overnight camp areas. The rate will be \$5.00 for 21 cu. ft. in group and organization camps. There will be fees for group picnic area reservations. The charges will be \$25.00 for up to 200 persons; \$50 for 201-500 persons; \$100 for 501 to 1,000; and \$150 for more than 1,000 persons.

Applicants to reserve group picnic areas will have to send full payment in advance plus a \$25 refundable deposit to cover breakage and cleanup. Applicants will have to arrange details with the park manager no later than five days before the reservation date. Applicants must be 18 and reservations must be cancelled at least three days before the event in order to get a refund. The first group trailer camp in a state park has been established at Silver Falls Park, southeast of Silverton, at the North Falls area, according to the report. There will be a \$1.00 per night charge, with \$10 minimum for groups.

Other new rules will allow campers to stay in one park for ten days out of any 14 day period. The previous rule allowed a stay of seven out of ten days. The new rule applies only from May 15 to Sept. 15, at other times campers can remain 14 consecutive days. Check out time from campgrounds is changed to 2:30 p.m. all days, the time had been 4:30 p.m. on Sundays and state holidays.
