# Charges Answered In U. S. Court

**DETROIT** - According to a report, two lumber executives pleaded innocent Thursday of last week to federal charges that they tried to eliminate competitive bidding for U. S. Forest Service timber.

They are L. James Bagley, head of the Oregon timber and logging division of Champion International Corp., and A. J. Frank, president of Frank Lumber Co. They entered their pleas before U. S. Magistrate George Juba. The two, plus two other men and six companies, were indicted in September on criminal conspiracy charges.

According to the report, they are accused of trying to stabilize prices at or near the minimum acceptable bid for timber from the Detroit Ranger Station Dist. in the Willamette National Forest.

The indictment also charges the defendants with planning to allocate the timber among themselves and bid up competitors not involved in the alleged scheme.

The federal government also has filed civil charges against defendants Champion International Corp., New York; Young & Morgan Inc.; Bugabo Timber Co. and Frank Lumber Co. all of Mill City; and Freres Lumber Co., Inc. and Freres Veneer Co., Lyons.

Individuals include Frank Bagley, Robert T. Freres and Vernon Morgan, secretary-treasurer of Young & Morgan. Tentative date for the criminal trial is June 9, according to the report.

# Chemeketa Community College

## FACTS ABOUT BALLOT MEASURE 24-2

**MAY 6, 1975**

Chemeketa's enrollment has skyrocketed during the past five years. Emphasis has been on training or re-training people in career skills and taking programs and community services to people.

Ballot measure 24-2 has been developed to accommodate 4,585 full-time equivalent students or more than 19,000 district residents — reflecting a 15 percent increase over our estimated 3,985 students this year.

**What is the amount of the levy?** The levy is \$3,454,414. Due to uncollectable property taxes the levy must be greater than \$3,112,086 needed to balance the college's operating budget.

**How much will this increase the tax levy rate?** The tax rate for 1975-76 will be \$1.29 per \$1,000 of true cash value. Last year the voters approved a \$1.27 per \$1,000 for the college's operating budget. Although voters approved a \$1.27 tax rate for the current year, increased true cash value of district property has resulted in an actual rate of \$1.20 per \$1,000 of true cash value. The proposed budget is a 7.5 percent increase in the gross tax rate or 9 cents per \$1,000 more than the current rate. This means that if your home is valued at \$20,000, you will pay \$1.80 additional taxes to support Chemeketa.

**How will the money be spent?** Money raised by the tax levy would be used to operate the college during the 1975-76 school year. The proposed budget is 65 percent instructional costs. In addition, 4.5 percent is for administration, 13 percent goes for physical plant and operation, 7 percent for business services, 5.5 percent for student services such as counseling, registration, financial aid and admissions and 5 percent for contingency and transfer. The contingency is an account controlled by the board to provide for emergency expenditures and to partially offset the cost of salary increases resulting from the collective bargaining negotiations and inflationary trends not provided for within the line-item budget. The transfer fund provides the required local dollars to match students financial aid grants and loans of both state and federal nature.

**What are the sources of revenue in addition to district taxes?** Local taxes represent 34 percent of the budget, other revenue includes 39 percent from state and federal sources, 18 percent in tuition and fees and 9 percent in other income including prior tax and working cash carry over. In an effort to maintain a balance between local, state-federal and student resources, a tuition increase of \$10 per term has been approved for 1975-76.

**Does the community college depend on the approval of a budget levy each year?** It certainly does. The college has no tax base. Therefore, the board of education cannot raise even one dollar of tax money without a vote of approval by the people.
