### "YOUR LAND AND MY LAND"

Have you ever thought about what happened to the families when their men shouldered their muskets and marched off to join General Washington's army?

Maybe it was springtime and the fields needed to be plowed and planted.

"Go along, John. We can manage. The west forty is cleared. The children and I will plant it to corn. When you come back you'll see a good crop ready for the harvest. We will plant two gardens — one for the soldiers and one for us.

In the settlements around Royalton, Vermont, a sudden attack was made by the Indians. Mrs. Hendee was working alone in the field, wishing her husband was home to help her.

The Indians entered her house and carried her children across the White River where it was a hundred yards and quite deep for fording, and placed them under keepers with 15 to 20 other children.

Returning from the field, Mrs. Hendee discovered the fate of her children. Like a lioness that has been robbed of her litter, she bounded on the trail of her plunderers. Resolutely dashing into the river, she pushed across. With pallid, flashing eyes and lips compressed she strode into the Indian camp regardless of the tomahawks pointed at her and boldly demanded the release of her little ones. She persevered in her scoldings, until her request was granted. She then carried her children back through the river and landed them safely on the other bank.

"Now you children stay right here. I'll be back."

Not content with what she had done, she immediately returned and begged for the release of others. She was rewarded with success and brought more children away. Again and again she returned until she had them all.

On her last visit to the camp she found the Indians so struck with her conduct that one of them declared that so brave a squaw deserved to be carried across the river and offered to take her on his back. In the same spirit she accepted the offer and mounted the back of the gallant savage. He carried her to the opposite bank where she collected her rescued troop and hastened away through the night to restore them to their grieving, frantic mothers.
