Milk Pool Fee To Be Increased In July

An order signed June 25, 1975 by State Director of Agriculture Leonard Kunzman will increase the milk market pool fee from two cents to three cents per hundredweight on all milk in the milk pool for the Oregon Quota Plan.

The new rate becomes effective July 25, 1975. The increase was brought about by the increasing inflationary trend, which has also seen the price to the milk producer for his Class 1 milk go up from \$6.85 per hundredweight in 1971 to \$9.64 per hundredweight.

It is the first increase in rate since July, 1971, when the two cent per hundredweight was set. Prior to January, 1970, the Oregon Quota Plan pool was supported by market pool fees and audit fees that together totaled 2½ cents per hundredweight. When the federal milk marketing order was initiated the audit fee was eliminated and the program operated on a one cent per hundredweight market pool fee until the July 1971, increase.

The same order that increased the market pool fee also revised that part of the milk stabilization regulations covering the payout to producers. The revision provides for a more systematic flow of money through the Oregon Dept. of Agriculture's business office to the producer.

The regulation changes followed a May 19 hearing in Salem with Ray Hobson, administrator of the milk stabilization program, as hearings officer.

Safety Tips for . . . Backyard Barbecues



Outdoor cooking offers hours of fun and relaxation for the entire family and for friendly gatherings, providing that certain safety steps are recognized and followed.

- 1. WHERE** to use the grill is an important consideration. Place the grill on level ground, where it will be stable. An anchored grill is a good choice, because it can't be tipped over. Select an open area for proper ventilation. Never attempt to cook indoors on a charcoal grill; the burning briquets can generate poisonous carbon monoxide fumes.
- 2. WHEN** to barbecue is influenced by weather conditions. On windy days, even if the grill's cooking area is protected by a windshield, be extra careful to prevent flames from escaping and doing damage to the surrounding area.
- 3. WHAT** to use to start a charcoal fire is important, because some materials are more dangerous than others.
