**Detroit District Recreation Report**

**ROADS**  
All district roads are open except for the following: Elkhorn-Elk Lake Road S80.1 is gated and closed to public travel. Opal Rim Road S81E is closed because of some washouts and is very hazardous. The last 1.5 miles of Presley Lake Road 110C is closed and gated. Breitenbush Road 224 (S46) is undergoing reconstruction from Clear Bend Bridge to the Mt. Hood boundary. Approximately 2.5 miles have been paved past Clear Bend Bridge, then about one mile has been rock-Breitenbush Road 224 to the ed as of 8-11-75. The rest of Mt. Hood N. F. Boundary is rough, gravel, and dirt.

**TRAILS**  
All district trails are open and passable. Pacific Crest Trail #2000 has snow drifts 2 to 3 feet in elevations of over 6,000 feet. However, it is passable and the snow is packed. Blowdown may be seen on portions of all trails. The work has been completed on the trails around Eight Lakes Basin, in and around Marion Lake, the Pacific Crest Trail #2000 from Santiam Pass for about 4 miles, all trails around Pamela Lake and Hunts Cove, and Jefferson Park Trail 3429.

**District 123J Policy For Free Meals And Milk Explained**

**DETROIT** — Detroit School Dist. 123J announces its policy for free meals and free milk, for children unable to pay the full price of meals and milk, served under the national school lunch, and special milk program.

Local school officials have adopted the following family size income criteria for determining eligibility.

Children from families whose income is at or below levels shown are eligible for free meals and free milk. In addition, families not meeting these criteria but with other unusual expenses due to unusually high medical expenses, heater costs in excess of 30 percent of income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, and disaster or casualty losses are urged to apply.

Application forms are being sent to all homes in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the superintendent's office. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

In certain cases, foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for such meals and milk for them, it should contact the school.

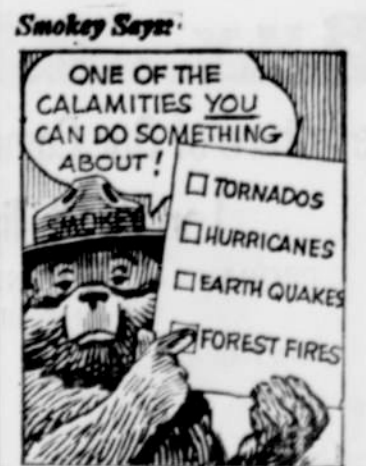
In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, or national origin. Under the provisions of the policy, the superintendent of the school will review applications and determine eligibility. If the parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he may discuss it with the school and may make a request either orally or in writing to Robert Young, Marion Foroks-854-3455, for a hearing to appeal the decision. The policy contains an outline of the hearing procedures. A copy of the complete policy is in the office of the superintendent where it may be reviewed by any interested party.

**Detroit Council Discusses Water Bills at Meeting**

**DETROIT** — The regular meeting of the Detroit City Council was called to order by Mayor Jim King at 7:50 p.m. Tuesday, Aug. 12. There were four citizens present.

Council members present were, Keith Krammer, Robert Layman and Vern Collins. Councilwoman Joyce Crist was absent. Minutes of the July 8 meeting were read and a treasurer and financial report given by city recorder, Ruth Thomasson. The minutes were approved as read.

A discussion followed on monies budgeted for water supt. work. Mayor King, instructed Water Supt. Ralph Edminster to make out separate reports designating water supt. work, and maintenance and repair work.

A discussion followed on delinquent water bills. Council took action against delinquent water users, instructing the water superintendent to discontinue water use to those who are delinquent until bills are paid in full. Councilman Collins suggested that the city attorney be contacted in regard to assessing liens against property of delinquent water users. Council agreed.

Motion was made, seconded and carried, that residents pay \$6 a month, or \$60 a year if paid by the year, until such time they notify the city they wish to have their water turned off. Council received notice from eight summer home owners to discontinue their water. Water will not be turned back on for any home until delinquent bills are paid in full. A \$5 fee will be charged for all reconnection.

A discussion on where there is a residence and a trailer on the same property and both are in use, each are considered a residence, therefore, each shall be charged for water. It has been reported that in some instances property owners are permitting trailer houses on the property and are being billed for one residence only, because they failed to notify the city of the trailer being occupied. Council to take action against offenders.

Frank Van Pelt, Sr., a citizen, ask the council about the grading of Hill St. St. Commissioner Robert Layman said the state won't grade the street because of exposed water lines. However, Layman said he would contact Ray Monroe about a grader, and added, that the street also needed ditching and a culvert.

Complaint presented about dogs being allowed to roam the streets. Mayor King said he had notified the Marion County Dog Control about the problem, but had not seen any action. Since the meeting, dog control officers have been in Detroit, and matters on the running of dogs has improved some, anyway, for the time being. It was asked that the city attorney be consulted regarding action the city can take in controlling the roaming dogs. Council agreed to contact the city attorney to see what legal steps the city can take on the dog situation.

Discussion followed on oiling of city streets. Mayor King said the DEQ prohibits the oiling of any street or road, due to the run-off causing contamination.

Street Commissioner Robert Layman, reported that a three inch asphalt lift was applied to Santiam Ave. at a cost of \$8,400.52. The Paving was done through a loan from the late Earl Layman and Mrs. Layman. The loan is on a three year basis, and the work was done by Santiam Sand & Gravel.

A complaint was heard on service and garbage cost of Canyon Collection Service. The service has a franchise with the city of Detroit. A discussion followed on just what the service would pick up or, would not pick up. Old tires cannot be picked up by the service nor can they be hauled privately to the city dump, Mayor King said.

In other business, a short discussion on flood insurance was held. City Recorder Ruth Thomasson, said Iris Henzel, vice-president of the planning commission, is to look into the matter, and report to the council.

Letters of communication were read and acted upon. There was also discussion on enforcing building and septic tank permits. Building commissioner, Keith Kramer, said rules and regulations are not being observed, and that he plans to check on property owners who have been issued

**TAKING A CLOSER LOOK**

A United States senator recently urged passage of legislation requiring "truth in labeling" of Congressional bills.

Too many proposals, he explained, carry tempting but misleading titles — making it next to impossible to explain a vote against them to those who have not read the fine print.

A case in point is a measure now before Congress termed the "equal opportunity and full employment act." Sponsors claim it would "guarantee the right to useful and meaningful employment to every adult able and willing to work." So far, so good.

But the means proposed to achieve this Utopian economic state are not so appealing. One major provision calls for the creation of a Job Guarantee Office, which would fund public and private employment projects "to the extent required," to achieve full employment.

With no spending limits set, the cost of this and other provisions of the bill could well outweigh the benefits. And it's the already overburdened taxpayers who will have to foot the tab.

Worse, the bill could open the door to a spate of lawsuits against the federal government, filed by irate workers convinced, rightly or wrongly, they are victims of "discrimination" in hiring and salary decisions.

In short, it provides one more example of a cure worse than the disease itself.

**New Permit System Termed Successful**

The "self-issue" wilderness permit system started this summer on the Willamette National Forest is finding good public acceptance, Forest Supervisor John E. Alecock announced. "We are finding just about 100% compliance with the system," he said.

The wilderness user this year finds registration stations on trails near the entrance to both the Mt. Jefferson and Three Sisters Wildernesses. The user fills out the form according to instructions at the station, and leaves the duplicate copy there, carrying the original into the wilderness.

"Our rangers report that most everyone they encounter in the two wildernesses have the permit," Alecock said. "When they don't, it usually is a result of misunderstanding how the system works."

The most common problems, the supervisor said, are these: Instead of taking the original and leaving the duplicate at the station, some people take both copies or leave both copies, or else they keep the duplicate and leave the original. They believe the system is voluntary as was the old wilderness registration system in effect about three years ago.

"None of the problems are serious, and to date we have not had to issue any citations for violation of wilderness use

such permits. The city recorder reported the city will receive a \$349 quarterly revenue sharing check.
