**Planning Commission Report**

Survey of road and street conditions that are in need of attention as compiled from the July 10, 1975 inspection and approved July 15, 1975 by the planning commission and presented to the Mill City Council for their consideration at the August council meeting.

The majority of the deficiencies noted are maintenance problems. Some, however, are intended to improve driving conditions and safety.

This survey is not intended to replace or interfere with a long range survey of traffic and streets, but to note immediate problems that could affect safety and retard further deterioration of our roadways.

**Problems on State Highway 22:**

(A)—Ditch lines need cleaned and brush obstructing visibility of drivers and pedestrians removed (example) roadside brush and briars completely block drivers visibility, to the West, when entering Highway 22 from Circle K north entrance, (example) ditchline brush blocks view to highway from North on West end of town.

(B)—Roadway should be widened to the South of concrete retaining wall between bridge and Highway 22, and water seepage controlled at this location.

**Problems on Marion County Roads:**

(A)—Overhanging brush and trees nearly enclosed extreme East end of N. E. Alder St.

**Problems on Linn County Roads:**

(A)—Recently dug ditch across S. W. Broadway at S. W. 4th is in bad repair.

(B)—Railroad crossing on S. W. Broadway needs repair.

(C)—Ditch lines and overhanging brush and trees need attention on S. W. Linn Blvd., S. W. Linn Place, S. W. Ivy, and S. W. Kingwood St. (example) Roadside brush completely blocks visibility at intersection of S. W. Ivy and S. W. Kingwood St. (example) Roadside brush extremely bad at intersection of S. W. 11th Ave. and S. W. Linn Blvd.

(D)—Condition of bridge across Deford Creek on S. W. Linn Blvd. checked as approaches are sagging on both ends of bridge.

**City of Mill City (Marion County):**

(A)—Street right of ways need mowed and overhanging trees trimmed.

(B)—Most all intersections need to be swept (loose rock erodes pavement)

(C)—Many holes in streets and shoulders need repair.

(D)—Remove No Parking sign by Railroad at North end of Bridge (no longer needed)

(E)—Time limit parking in area of bank and post office between 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. (especially on N. W. Wall St.)

**City of Mill City (Linn County):**

(A)—All roadsides need mowed.

(B)—Vacant lot on N. E. corner of intersection of 1st Ave. S. and Kingwood to increase driver visibility.

(C)—Paint yellow traffic dividing lines on funnel shaped intersection to direct traffic, (example) intersections of 1st Ave. S. and Grove, Hazel, and Fairview Sts.

(D)—Stop line at 1st Ave. S. and S. W. Broadway should be moved ahead several feet or removed in lieu of a yield sign as before.

(E)—Need highway direction sign by Stewart's Grocery (causes confusion and traffic congestion by strangers and would replace sign that stood for years)

(F)—Too much parking restriction on S. W. Broadway and intersections of S. W. 2nd and 3rd.

(G)—No parking sign on Cedar St. by city hall confusing (street not full width, perhaps should be one way.)

(H)—Most all intersections need swept (loose rock erodes pavement.)

(I)—Additional property should be acquired on S. W. Evergreen between S. W. 2nd Ave. and 1st Ave. S. to provide legal street with parking on North side and make possible the resolution of the many problems at the intersection of S. W. Evergreen and S. W. 2nd Ave.

(J)—Guard rail on West side of sidewalk on 1st Ave. (on hill by Don Steythe's place).

**Mill City (General):**

(A)—Crosswalks and stop-lines need painted.
