## Large Crowd Attends Church Picnic Sunday

The Rally Day and Homecoming potluck picnic for Presbyterian Church members and friends was a great success Sunday, Sept. 7, with about 100 persons, including many children, attending the affair at the Cedar's Shelter at Fishermen's Bend Park. Highlight was the musical presentation by the Heesch Family Singers (Harmelettes) of Scio, including Mrs. Heesch and her four daughters.

At the 11:00 a.m. worship hour, the soloist was Mrs. Helen Cox, who sang "King of Love My Shepherd Is," and "He Loved Me," accompanied by Jean Scott at the organ.

Assisting the Rev. John Heidbrink during the communion service were the following deacons: Katie Ewell, Faye Verbeck, Mary Tuers and Mary Kelly.

The afternoon's festivities at the picnic area opened with the bounteous potluck dinner at tables under the shelter. The arrangements were made by the deacons and John Heidbrink, who was emcee, and announced the program numbers.

The attractive Heesch girls, three teenagers and a 12-year-old who played the drums, and their mother, who directed them and manipulated the electronic equipment, were neatly outfitted in matching pant-suits. Besides the drums, they played the accordion and the guitar. One girl plays piano or organ ordinarily when they appear indoors. It was said they missed their father in the presentation, as he is usually the leader with the base guitar, but he had been called to Alaska. The dozen or more numbers were well received. The young ladies were accompanied to the picnic by a group of friends from Albany.

At the close of the musical program, Edith Mason gave an enlightening, and sometimes humorous, sketch concerning the history of this area, especially that of the Presbyterian Church, mentioning names of some of the early settlers and pointing out a few of the first buildings here which are still in use. Mill City, having been a company-owned town by the Hammond Lumber Co., many incidents were remembered by the "old-timers" present.

It was stated that the Women's Missionary Society, the name later being changed to the Presbyterian Women's Assn., was organized in October of 1894 when the church was chartered with 13 charter members. The first Sunday School was in the Rock Creek schoolhouse, and was conducted by the parents of Miss Daisy Geddes, who still lives here. Volunteer laborers who worked on the church, and the names of many early day ministers were also mentioned.

James Swan showed a picture of the church membership in 1929. At the close of the full day of activities, Bob Hayes introduced a few games. Horseshoes was also played.
