DuLac Addresses Detroit Council

DETROIT — The regular meeting of the Detroit City Council was moved ahead a day so that District Ranger Dalton DuLac could address the council and audience on Land Use Planning. The Sept. 8 meeting Monday was called to order by Mayor Jim King at 7:40 p.m. There were three citizens present.

Council members present were Robert Layman, Keith Kramer, and Joyce Crist. Councilman Vern Collins is on vacation.

Minutes of the August meeting were read and a treasurer's report given by city recorder, Ruth Thomasson. The minutes were approved as read following one correction.

Mr. DuLac gave an interesting and informative talk on the Willamette National Forest's Land Use Plan Program.

His talk on the plan was similar to that he gave at a recent meeting at Mill City of which the highlights of his speech were published in the Aug. 14 issue of The Mill City Enterprise. No comments were taken at the Monday night meeting. Comments will be received at the Nov. 5 meeting in Mill City and at other meetings around the state. All comments have to be in before November 10, 1975. DuLac announced that a field trip is scheduled for Sept. 27 with the buses leaving Salem at 8:00 a.m. A tour will be made of three drainages in connection with the Land Use Planning program. Representatives of various councils are being asked to participate in the tour.

A discussion followed on the development of more recreation including the possibility of a small airport to bring more people into the area. It was brought up that, at one time, a group of local pilots were interested in developing an airstrip on the flats in the Detroit area. However, this did not materialize. Council agreed that an airstrip would be a rewarding asset to the community.

Council accepted the report of the planning commission presented by Pete Howard, president. The report involved flood insurance, safety and street improvements.

In other business, Mayor King read a letter from the city's attorney in regards to what steps the city can take legally in controlling dogs running at large. The attorney said the city has a legal right to appoint a deputy city constable to pick up and transport to the dog pound any dog running at large. City officials plan to take action. Other letters of communication were read and acted upon.

A discussion followed on Continental Telephone Company asking the PUC to allow them to raise phone rates. Complaint about some towns being allowed to call other towns free of charge where as the Upper North Santiam Canyon does not have this privilege. A letter registering a complaint will be sent to the PUC.

City recorder, Ruth Thomasson, reported revenue sharing received of \$1,986.49. Meeting adjourned at 9:45 p.m.



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
