Grand Worthy President Joseph E. Fournier

Joseph E. Fournier of San Diego, Calif., newly-elected grand worthy president of the Fraternal Order of Eagles, is beginning a term in office in which he expects to lead the order to 130,000 new members and at least 76 new local aeries.

Elected at the 1975 Grand Aerie Convention in Dallas, Texas, Fournier culminated a long and active Eagle career. He has served as San Diego Aerie worthy president and in all the chairs along the line; as California state president, and two terms as regional president. In 1971 he was elected to the Board of Grand Trustees, and two years later as grand vice president. Following this service he became grand worthy president-elect at the 1974 convention.

Fournier is a native of Bridgewater, Mass., where he

attended school and obtained a job as a molder in the Boston Navy Yard. He interrupted this work to enlist in the Marine Corps in 1943, and he fought in some of the major battles in the South Pacific during WWII, attaining the rank of master sergeant.

After being discharged from the Marines at the end of the war he decided to make San Diego his home. He secured employment at the headquarters of the 11th Naval District, there, rising to the position of Director of the Production Control Division of the Public Works Center of the naval district. He held this job until his retirement over two years ago.

Fournier has given much valuable service to the Eagles. He has organized three new local Aeries during his career, and has been a leader in the Eagles' "Under 35" and "Mr. and Mrs." programs. Expanding both of these are among his aims for the 1975-1976 fraternal year.

His wife, Aileen, is a past California state president of the Auxiliary and organizer of two local Auxiliary units. She will accompany him on his travels throughout Eagleland during his term as grand worthy president.

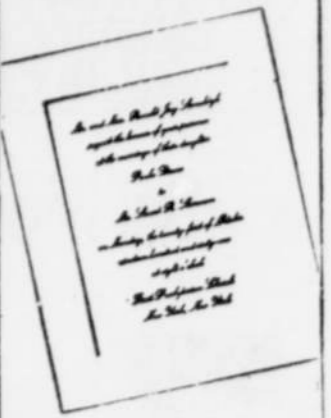
